


















# For many, autumn "might be the be-all and the end-all here . . . "







































#### Politics 1973





#### Rising thermometers mark a mild winter




# Students express their desires to create





## Academic and social life combine at Blair



























#### Administration shines the guiding light





























## Wrestlers grapple with tough competition






















