








However, for most, pimples seemed to be one's worst enemy. "I have this recurring zit under my left eye," lamented junior Denise Sharpe.





Junior Reva Gupta likes her room because she spends a lot of time in it. "My room is like my own house; I have everything that belongs to me in there." --MM


Avoiding her parents is not difficult for junior Backy Nulty with her basement bedroom. Almost all students used their rooms as a place to hide and get away from their parents at least once.



The Wheaton Ice Rink was another popular gathering place. "I skate whenever I need to relax," said senior Sharon McNeal.















Senior Jason Crutchfield --"Gym was the only class I ever got an A average in."



Although the beginning of the year seemed hectic, Guidance and Attendance did eventually get around to helping everyone; either getting their classes changed or getting people to class on time. --MM








In the auditorium, senior Daniella Boff prepares to take her portraits in the traditional black drape. Portraits were taken as early as May of the junior year up through October of the senior year.

Taking The Reigns

























Anyplace Else


Senior High






























After High School

PSAT would insure a junior of at


least a Merit Letter of Commendation and possible a National Merit Scholarship. Colleges looked at GPA, test scores and financial need when decided who would receive a scholarship.


Faces in the Crowd




"Student Government





















was something everybody did at least once a day when they came to school. One might not have realized it, but it did happen.

When people from other countries came to the United States, they had to change their environment. This was a change far too great for most native born students to understand. Immigrants had to change everything: their speech, actions, clothing, foods, and many other things.

When foreign students came to school, they had to go through yet another change. While school environments were difficult to adapt to for everyone, for people who did not speak English, it was even more difficult. 

















In the second year of Super Quest, the team cut back from four to three members. Blair was usually in the semi-finalists for this competition. --RG & AH
















One task of the marching band was to be directly involved in the football games. Like the cheerleaders, they had to cheer their team by playing different songs.






















The 1989 season was one that will easily be forgotten. Despite having a losing record the team never quit, only proving that no matter what the score said, the Blazers were always winners. --PM





had to run lots of hills and countless numbers of laps to prove that they deserved a spot on the J.V. team.



The team suffered a few disappointing losses, but they also had many sweet victories. They had a successful season, finishing it with a win-loss record of 7-3.




The games J.V. found most difficult were those against Walter Johnson,






Dynamic Defense



A Tradition of Excellence







With an incredible and outstanding winning record, the girl's varsity basketball team proved itself unbeatable and unstoppable. The team has truly earned its title of champions. --PD







Wrestling is an extremely demanding sport. Only a few dedicated Blazers had the strength and courage it took to be on the Montgomery Blair wrestling team. This past season the






Though the season was not as r warding as it might have been, the wrestlers still had fun and could lot forward to a more successful future.



Senior Seth Krusa, another lacrosse player, liked the game because "it is


fast, has a lot of contact, running, and it is exciting as well as challenging."





Several days a week after school, these girls met with the main objective


of representing our school in a fashion we could all be proud of. Compared to cheerleaders at other schools, one would never doubt that our cheerleaders knew how to get down and boogie.





The team shot rifles in the range in the basement of the school, and practiced with the heavy safety equipment including shooting pants, jackets, and boots. --SR & PC






