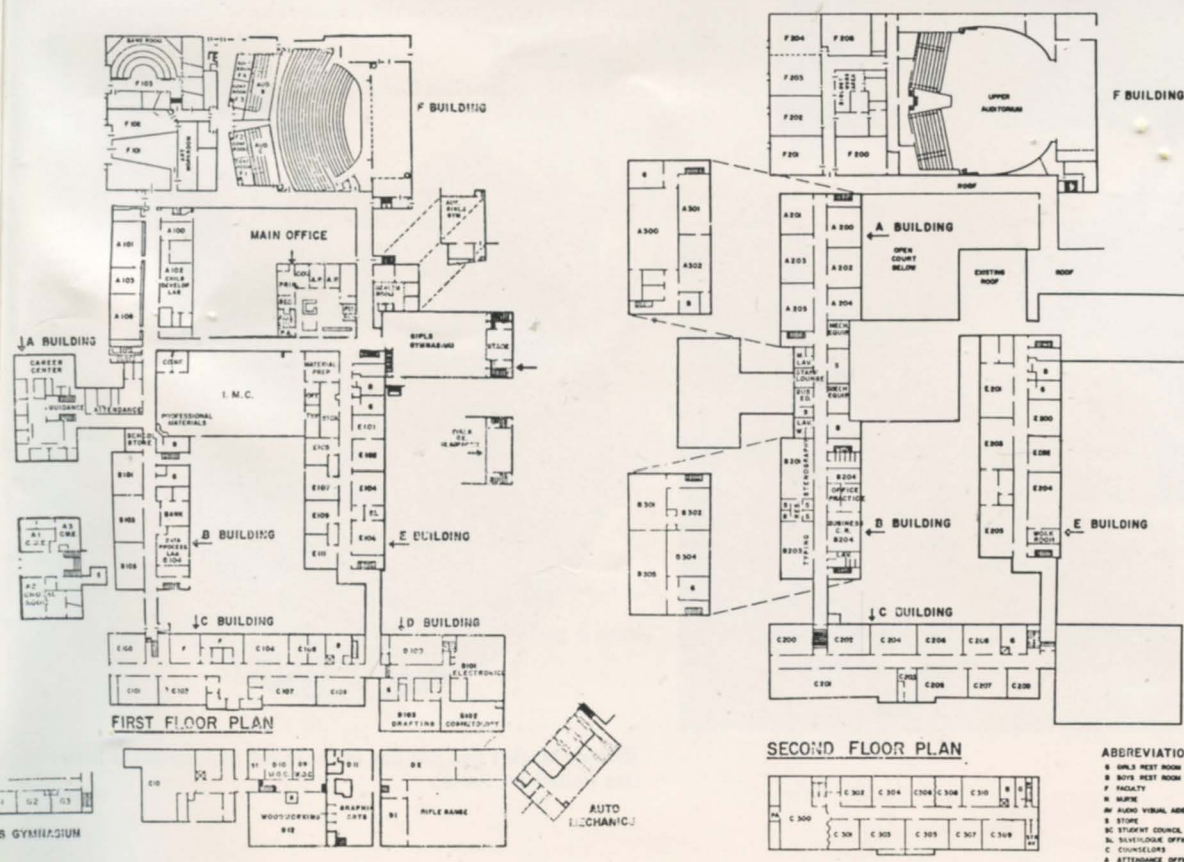

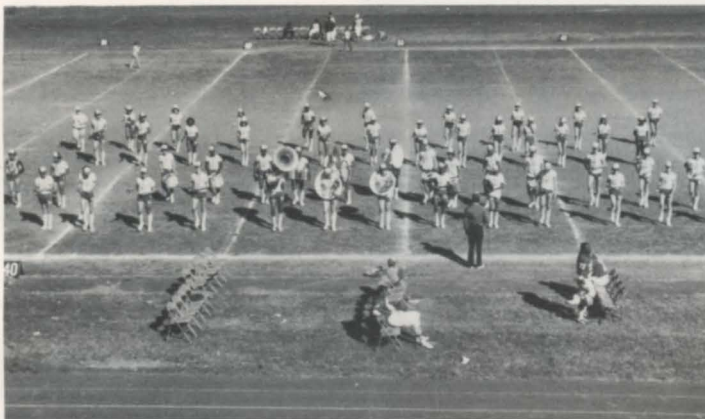

After school is the perfect time to relax, as demonstrated by Becky Idoni, Jeanette, Monica Pacheco and Diana Haggerty.

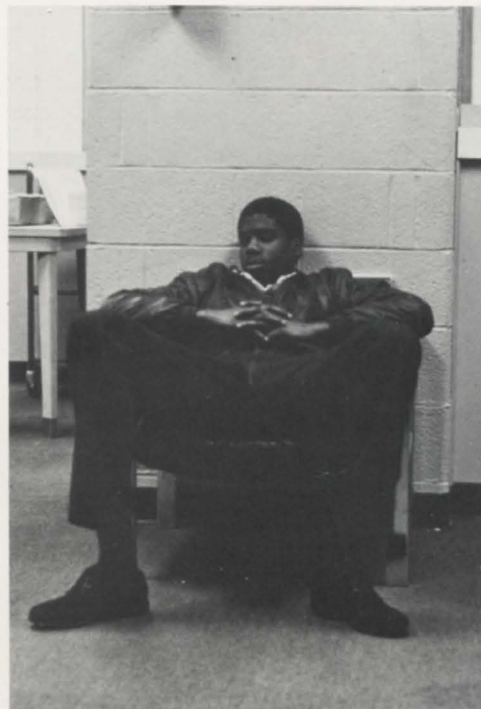

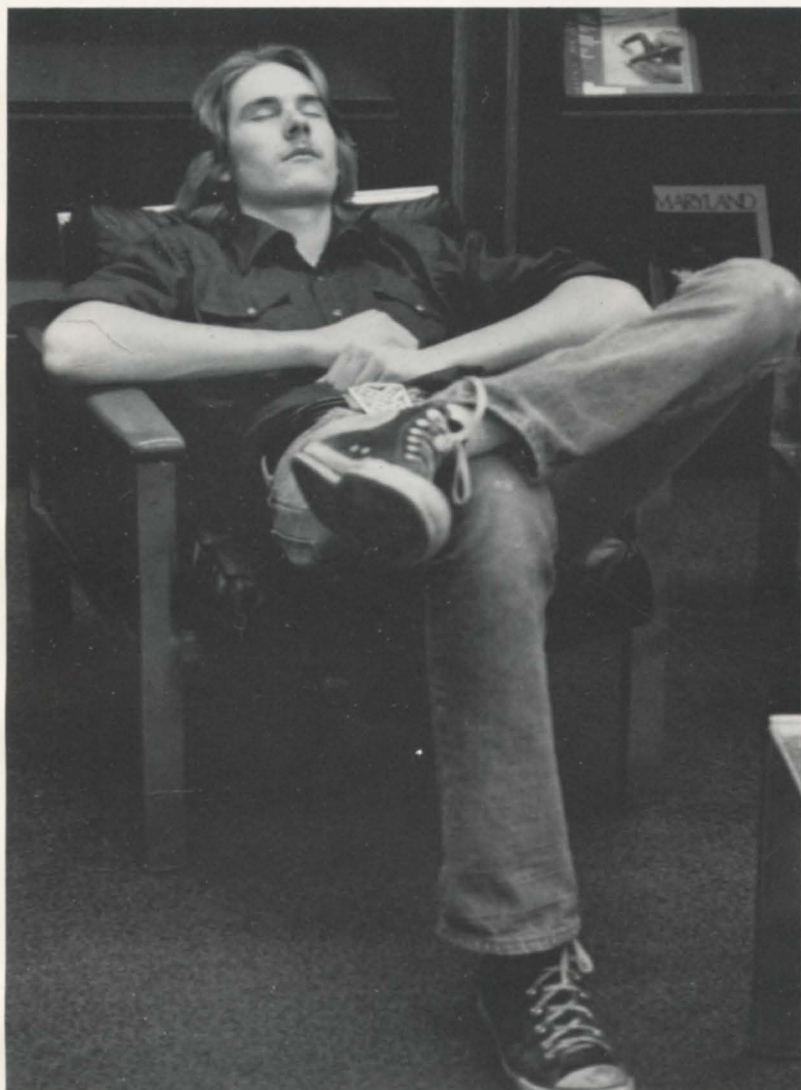

All in all, the hard work payed off as the "Birds" proved to be definitely not for the birds!



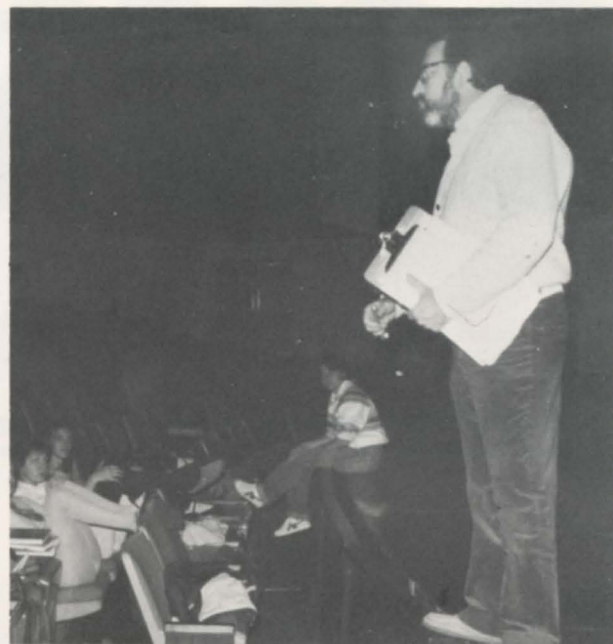

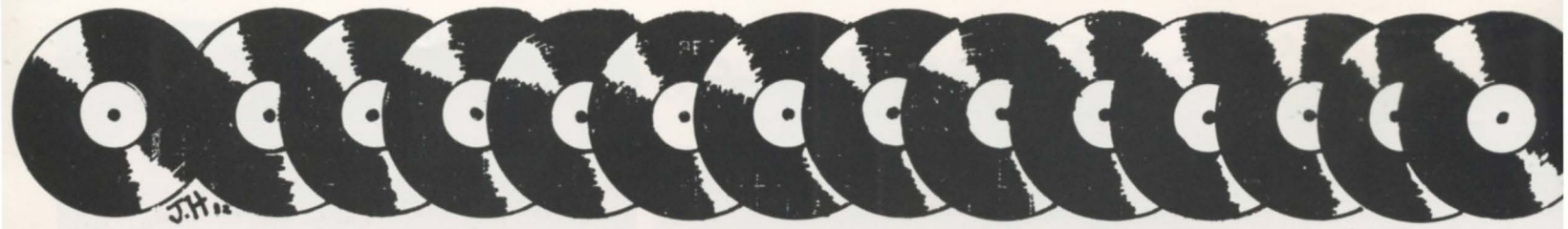

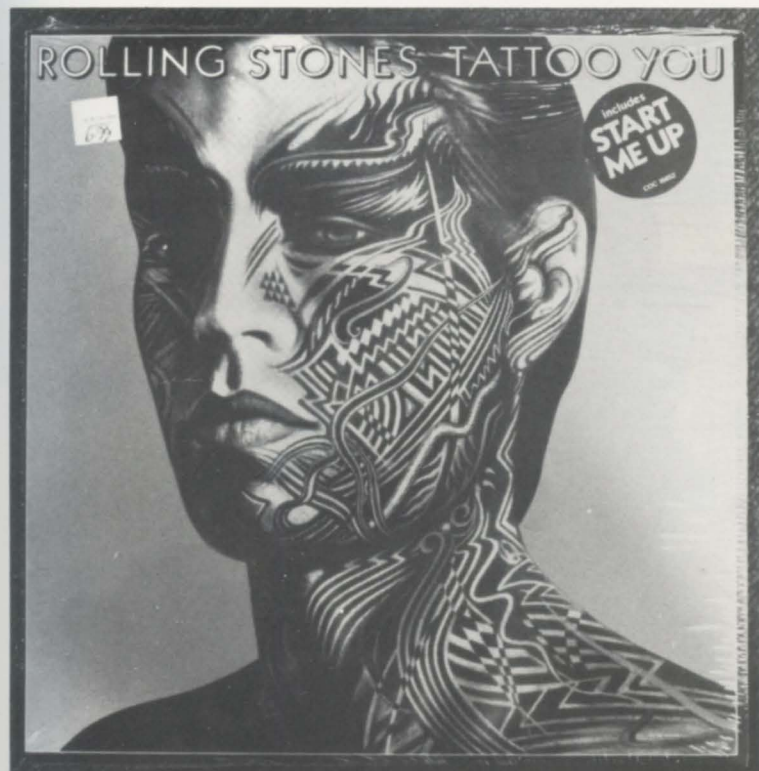
soul- /'sol/- Music that originated in American Negro gospel singing. It is closely related to rhythm and blues, and is characterized by the intensity of feeling and earthiness.

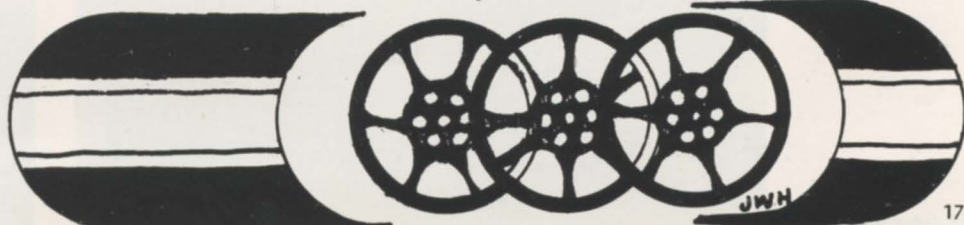

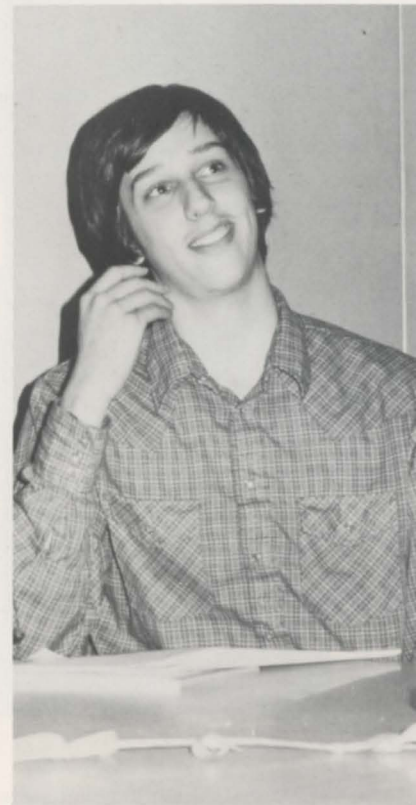

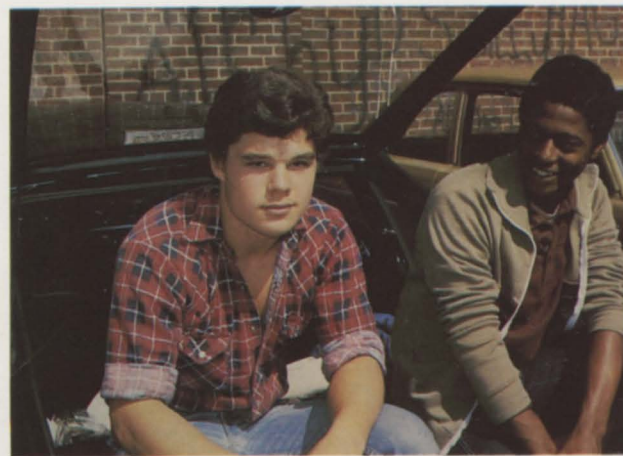

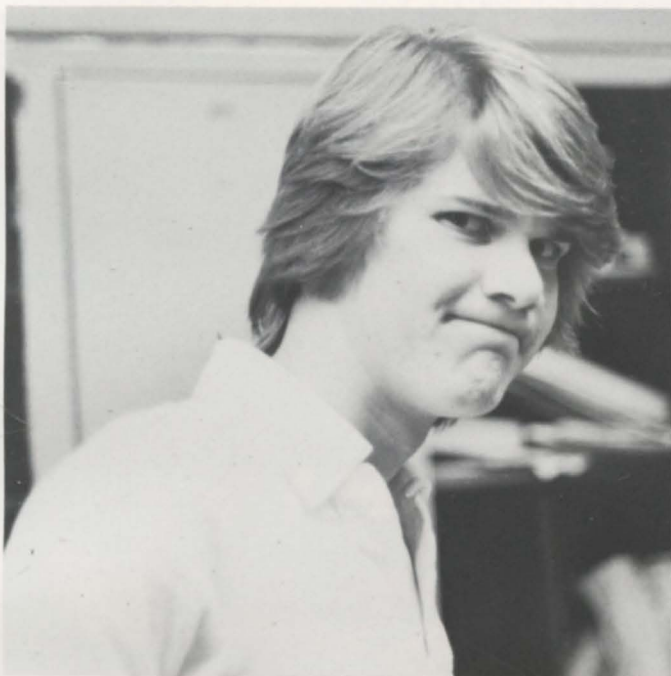

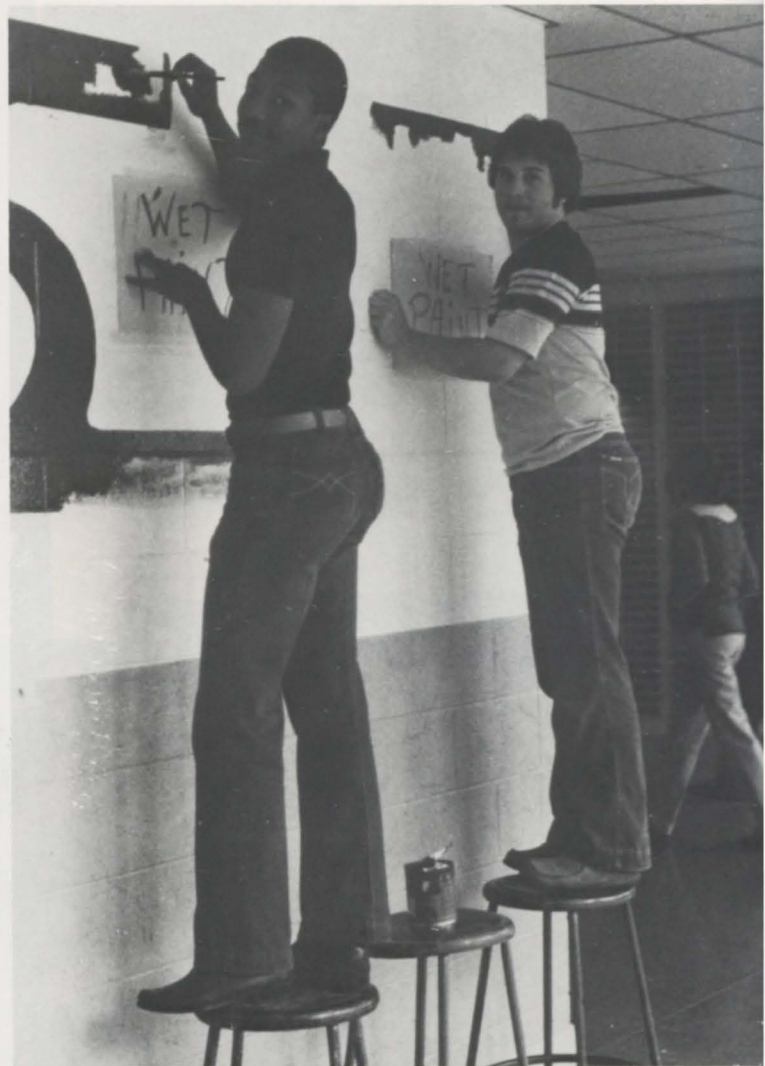

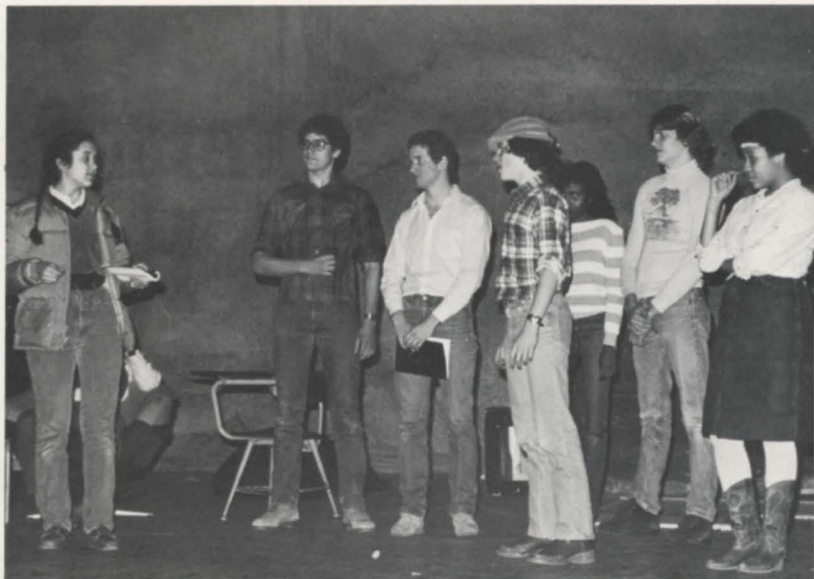
Altogether, Blair proudly applauded and thanked the entire student involvement in "Mame" for such a spectacular show.

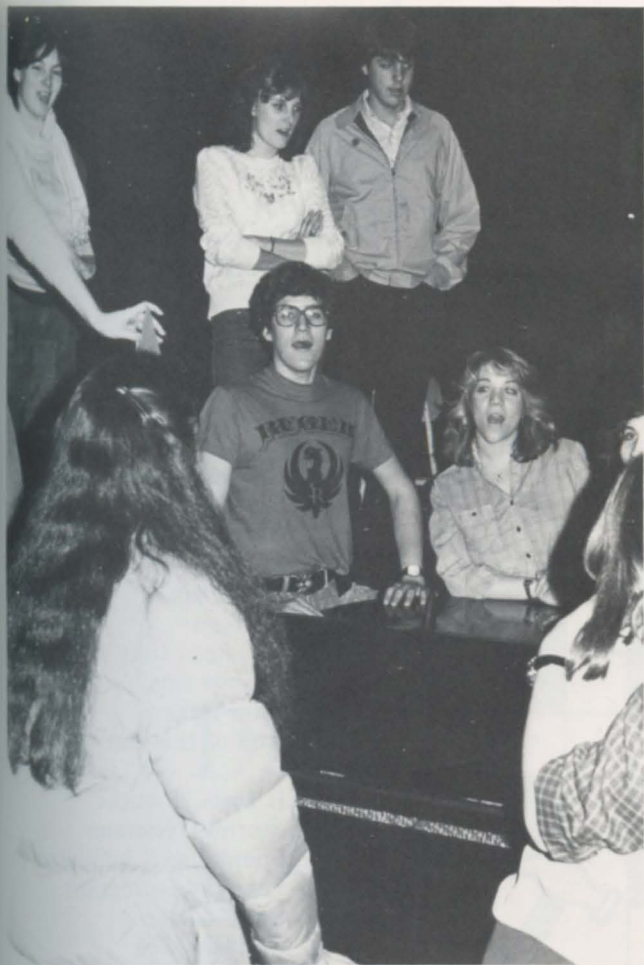

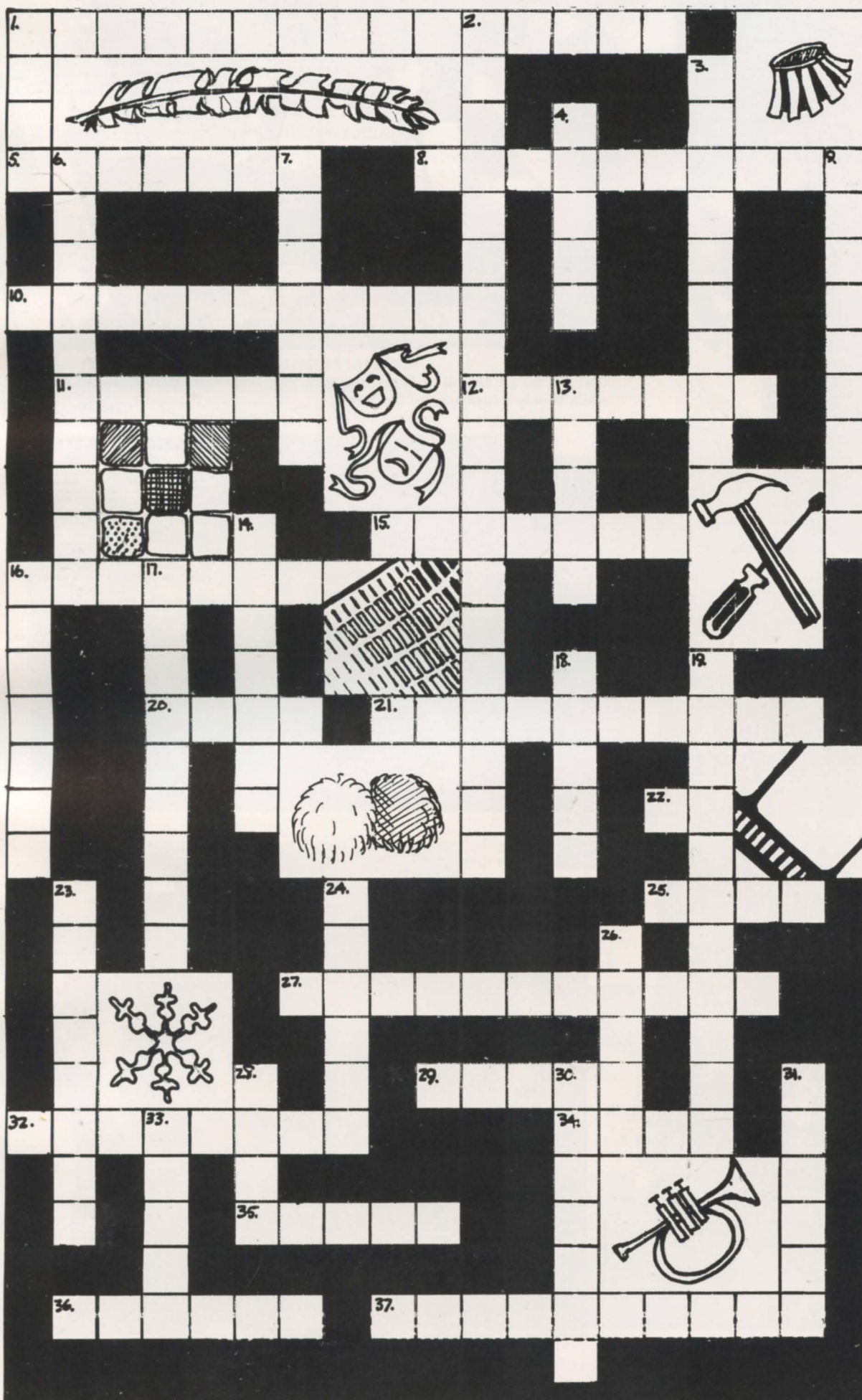

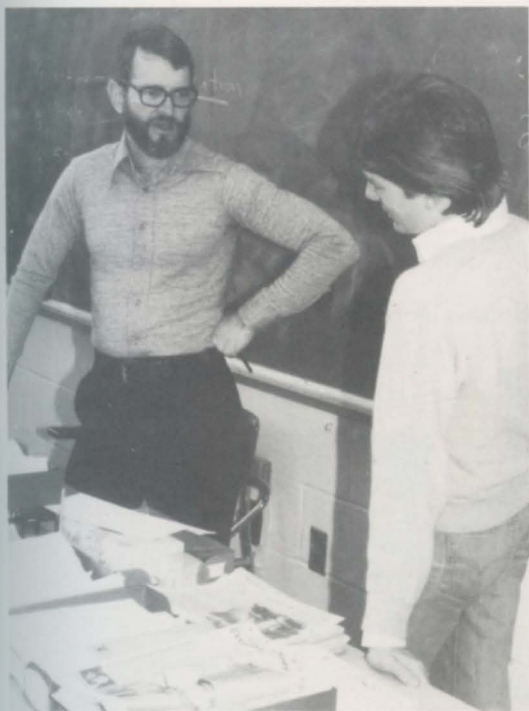

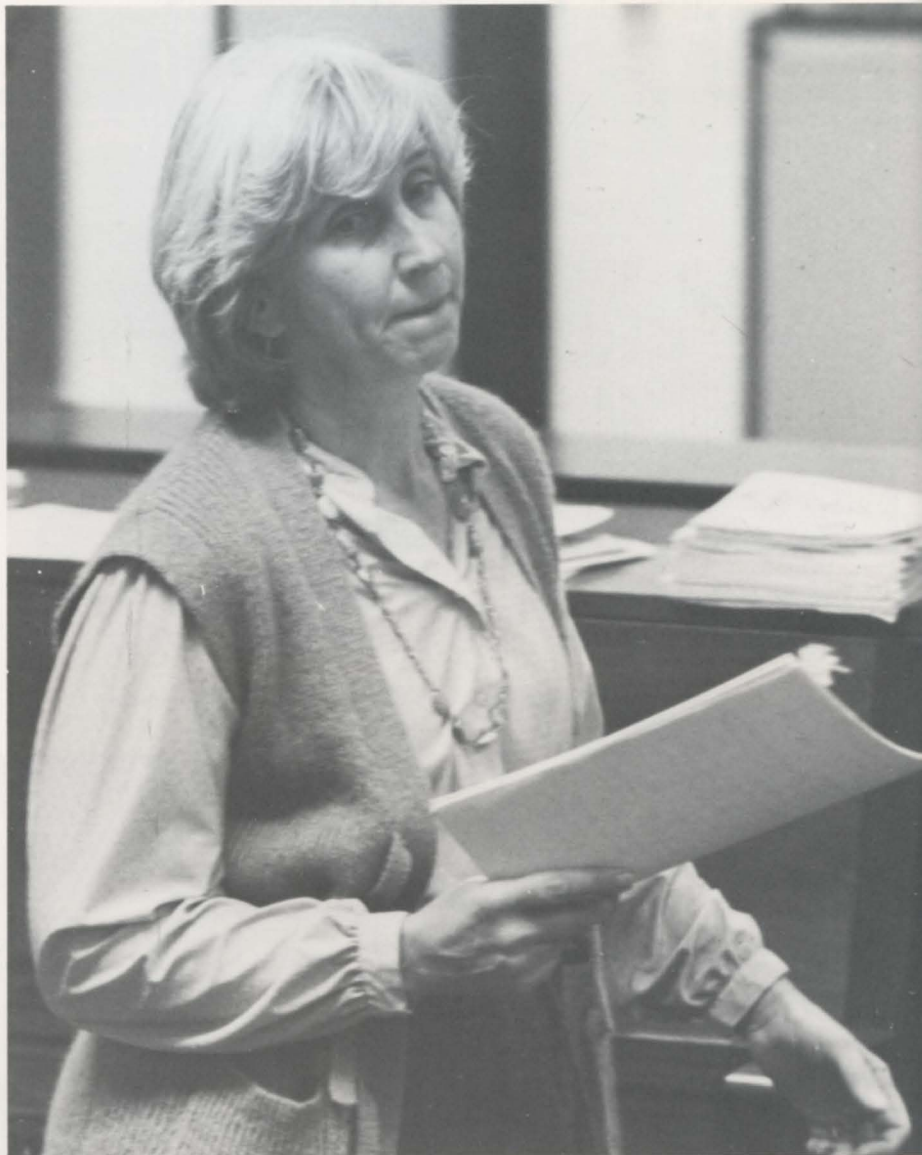


Music Department Brings Pride

Students took I.A. to learn skills which they would use not only in the future, but also at the present time; they would use these skills NOW. Suppose a student had been experiencing car trouble. He would be taught how to fix the problem in auto shop. When someone wanted to send out party invitations, he could print them in print shop. If a girl wanted to give her brother a special birthday present, she could make him a wooden bowl, a chair, or even a table in her woodworking class. Now, say a girl was asked to give her friend a manicure- she could learn how in cosmetology. 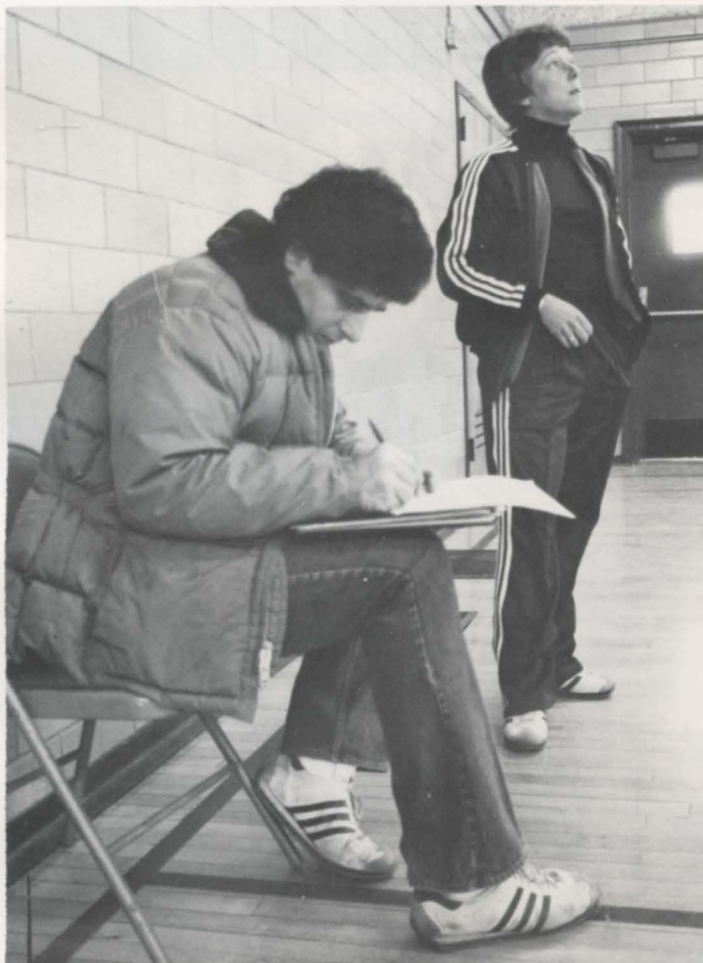
A Fun Class

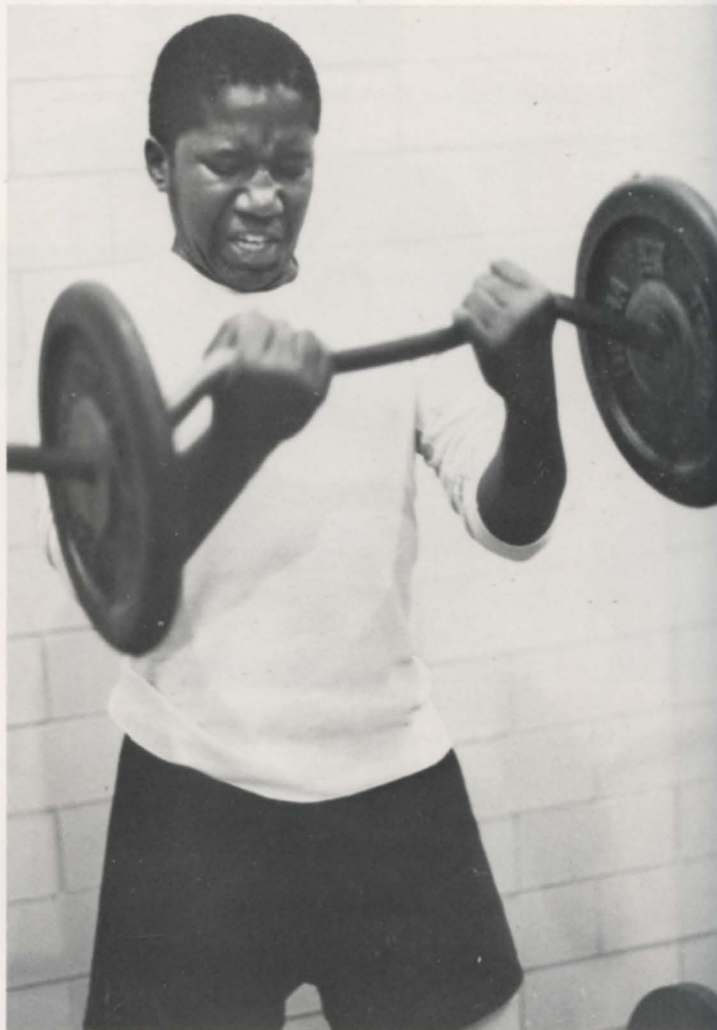

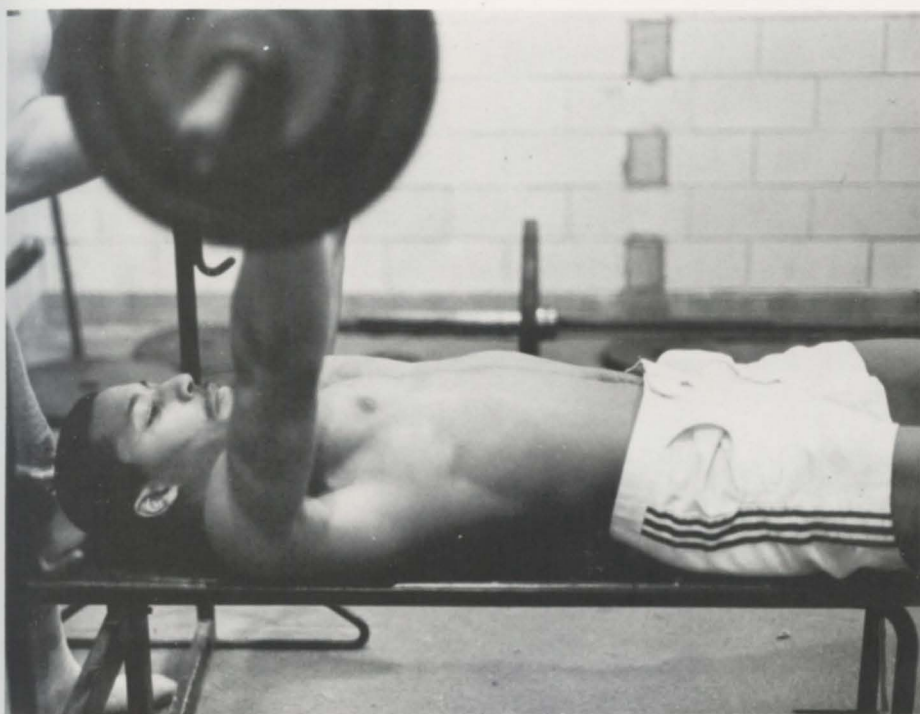

The Health Education Department offers courses in human behavior, health occupations, health electives and family life and human development. Family life and human development is a course that covers various areas of family life including human sexuality. Health occupations is a career preparation course for both men and women interested in jobs in health assistance fields. 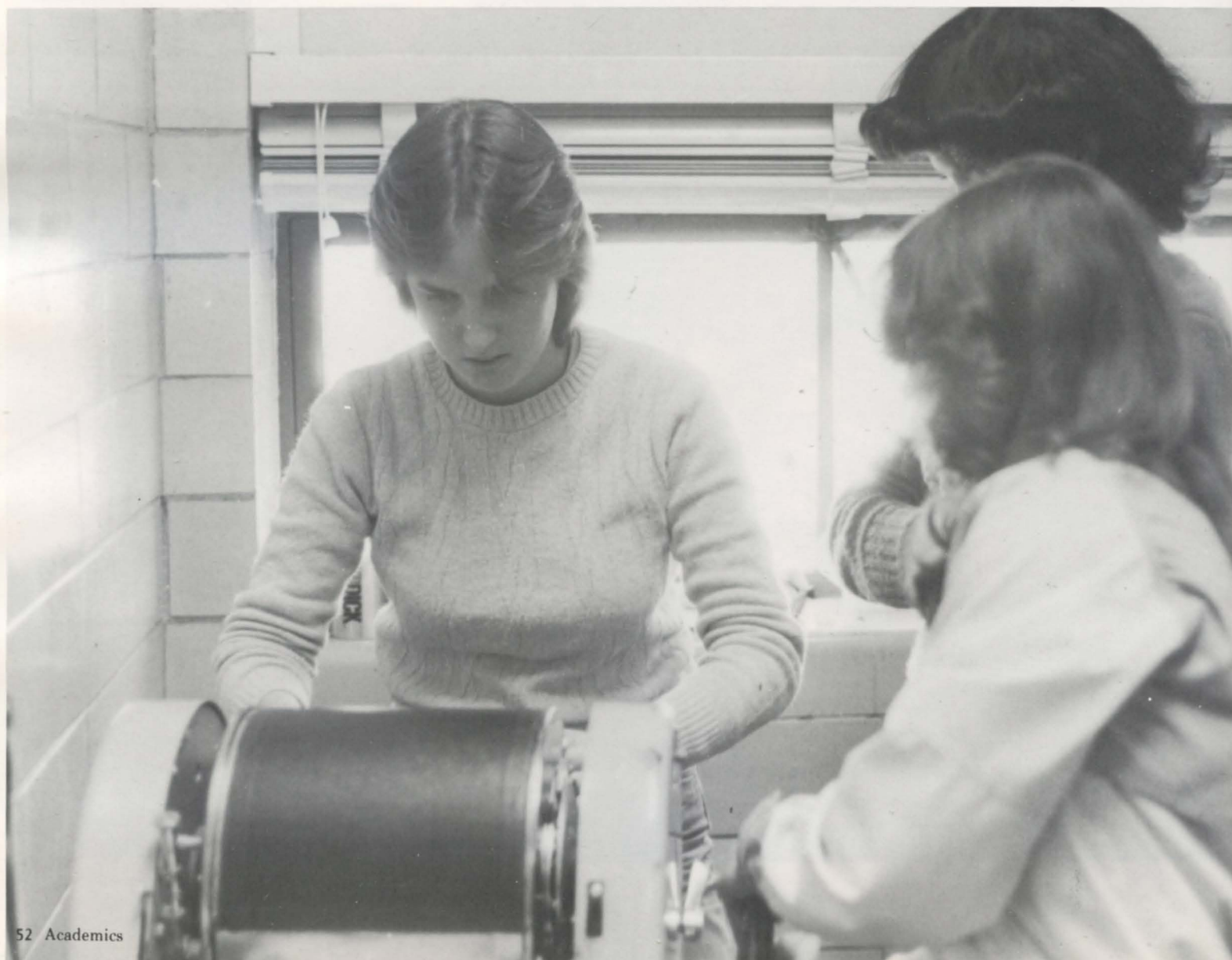
Business Is The Key To Success

For students interested in Business Education, Blair had many choices to offer. There is typing, shorthand, business machines, and office practice. Additional courses in book keeping, accounting, salesmanship, business math, and business law are offered to give the Blair student a sense of "Big Business".

Data processing was taught in three levels, with the third level providing on-the-job training. Vocational subjects such as cosmetology, auto mechanics, and printing often provide the students with good jobs before graduation. Technical courses in electronics, designing, and drafting gave students practical knowledge for those planning to work in related fields.

Driving Through "82"

The driver education department is made up of three divisions which are classroom, simulators and on the road driving. During the first nine weeks, the teachers divide each class into two groups, A and B, which are made up of fifteen students. Every two days, the groups alternate. While group A goes to the classroom, group B goes to the simulators, which were installed and hooked up this year. Since there are only twelve simulators, three of the fifteen students go out driving with one teacher. Thus, every driver education student is given the chance to drive once every ten days.

In the second nine weeks, the simulator requirements have been filled and each student gets a driving lesson every five days.

In order for a student to obtain a drivers education certificate, he must pass the course and complete the requirements. The state sets the requirements, such as a minimum of thirty hours in the classroom, twelve hours of simulation and three hours of actual driving.

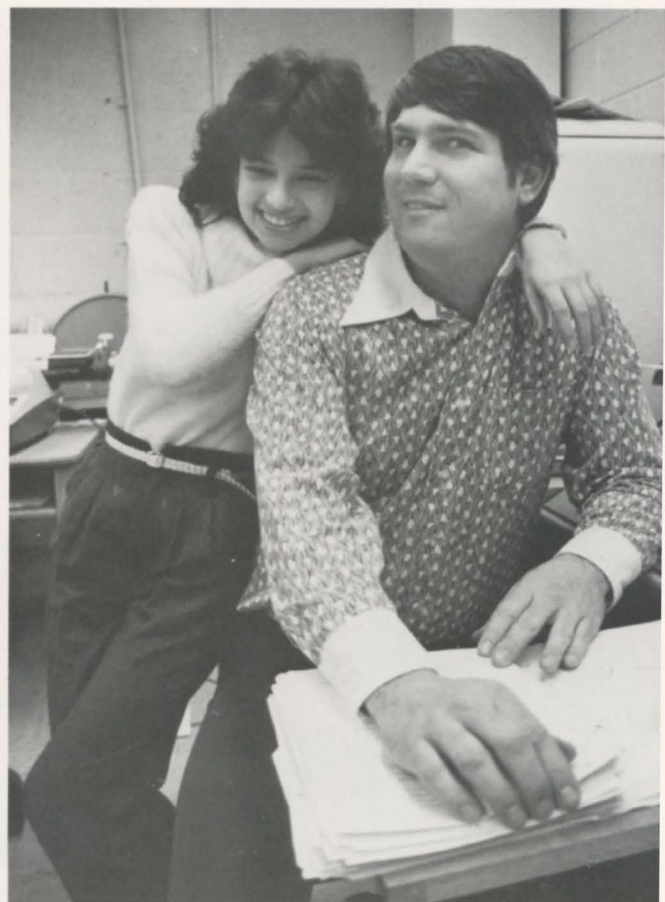

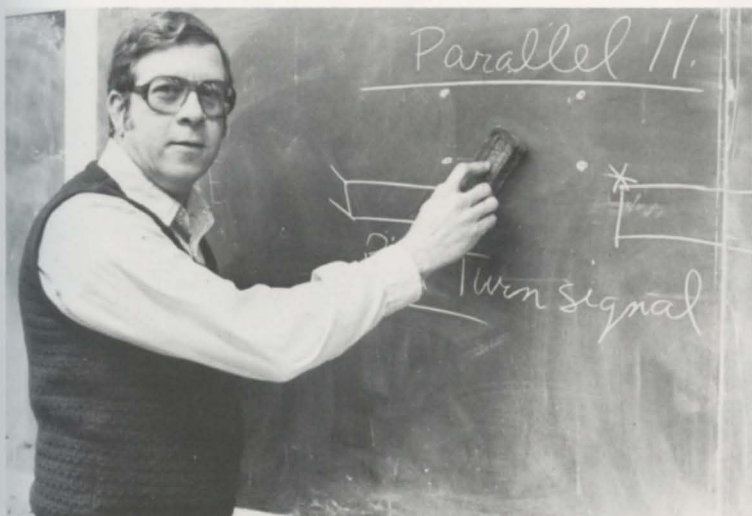

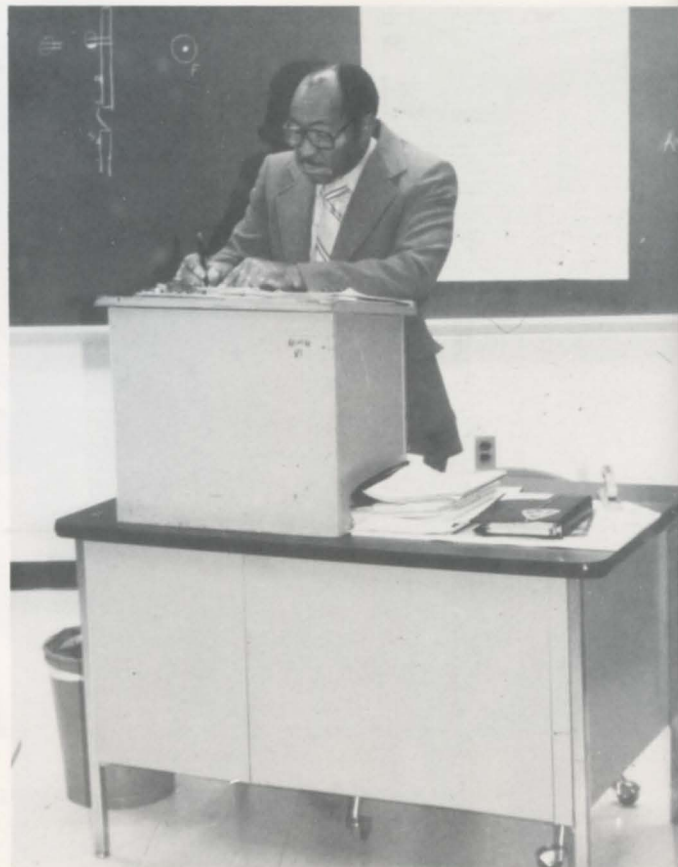

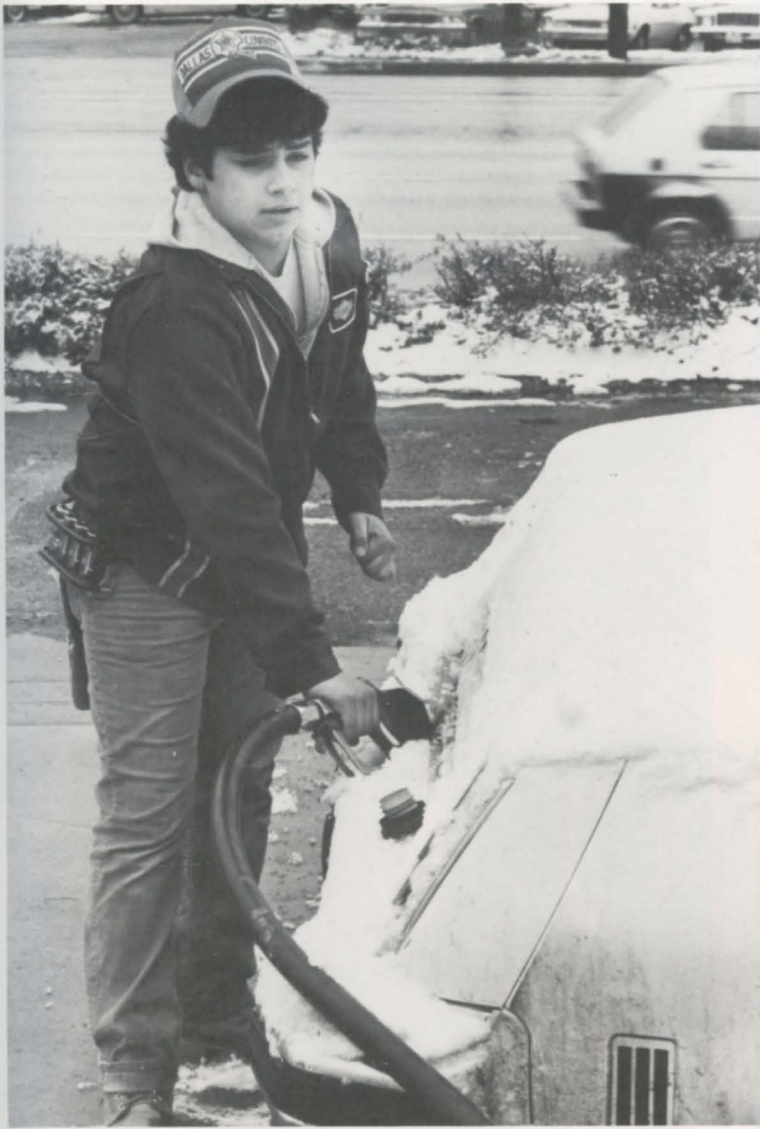

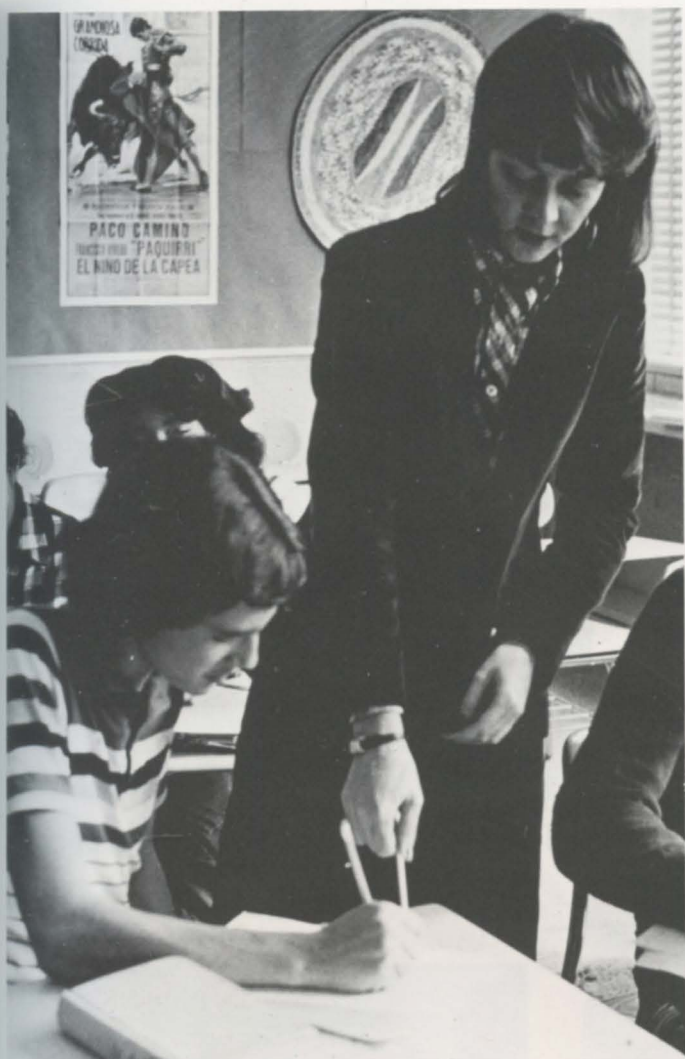

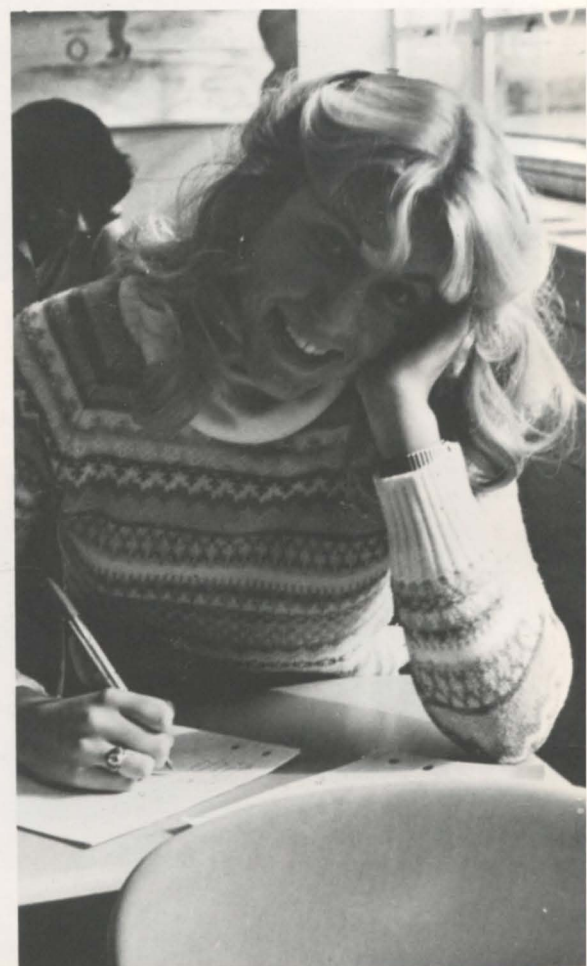

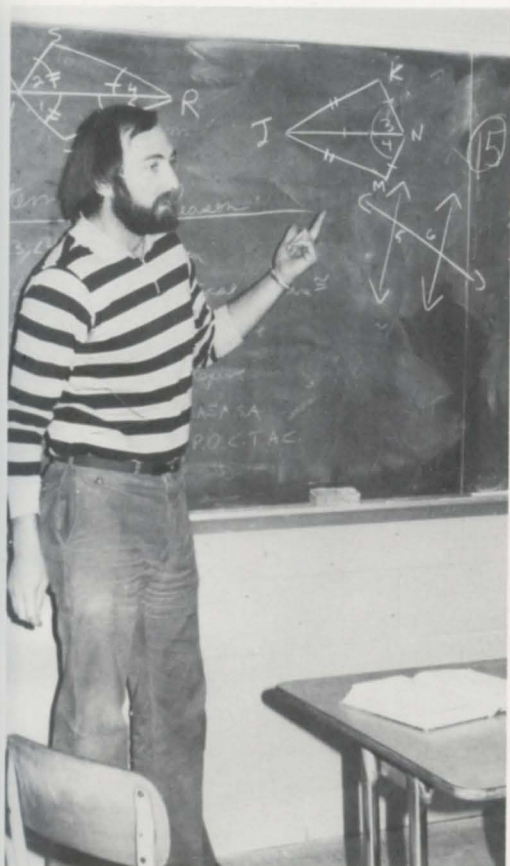

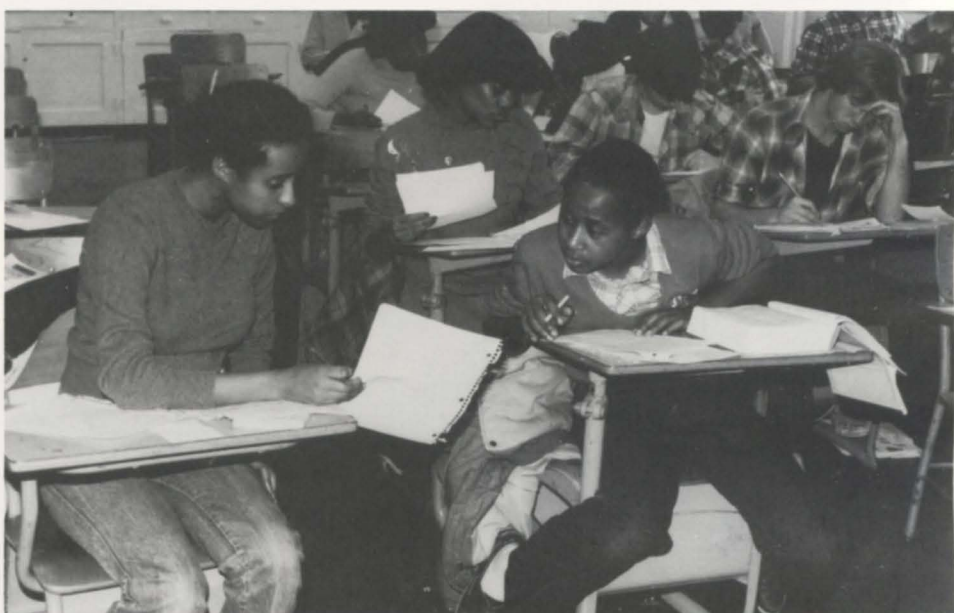

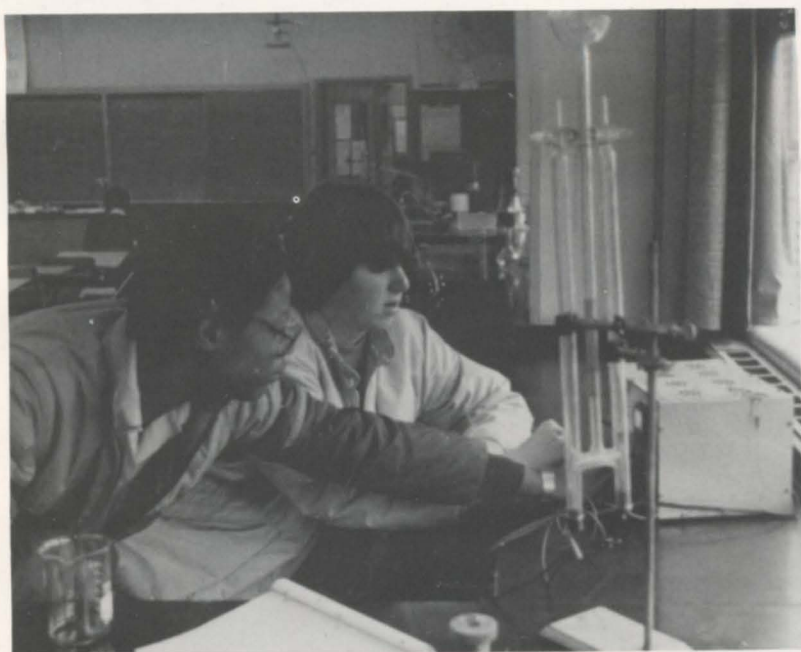
This year biology was a popular choice for sophomores. This completed their final science credit, but if further study in science was desired, Blair's science department could accommodate.

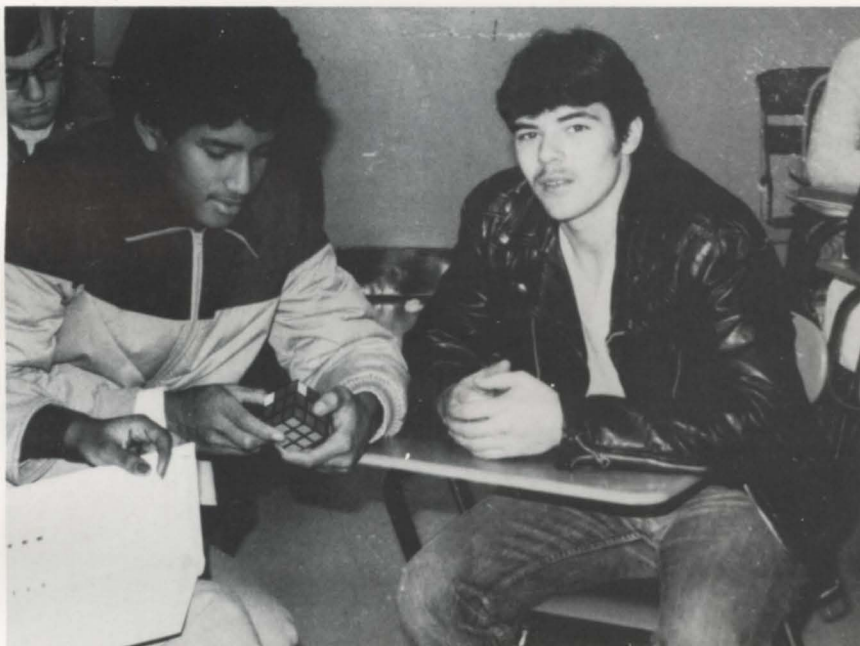
Courses such as Law, Psychology, or Sociology not only met the special interests of the students, but helped them make future career choices.

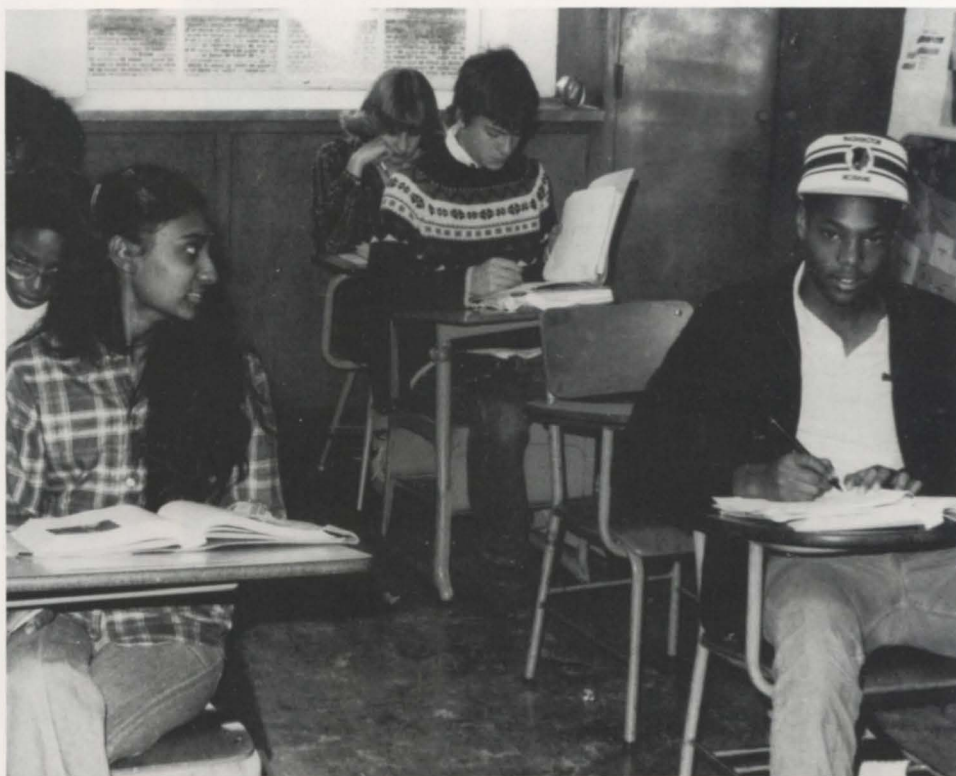

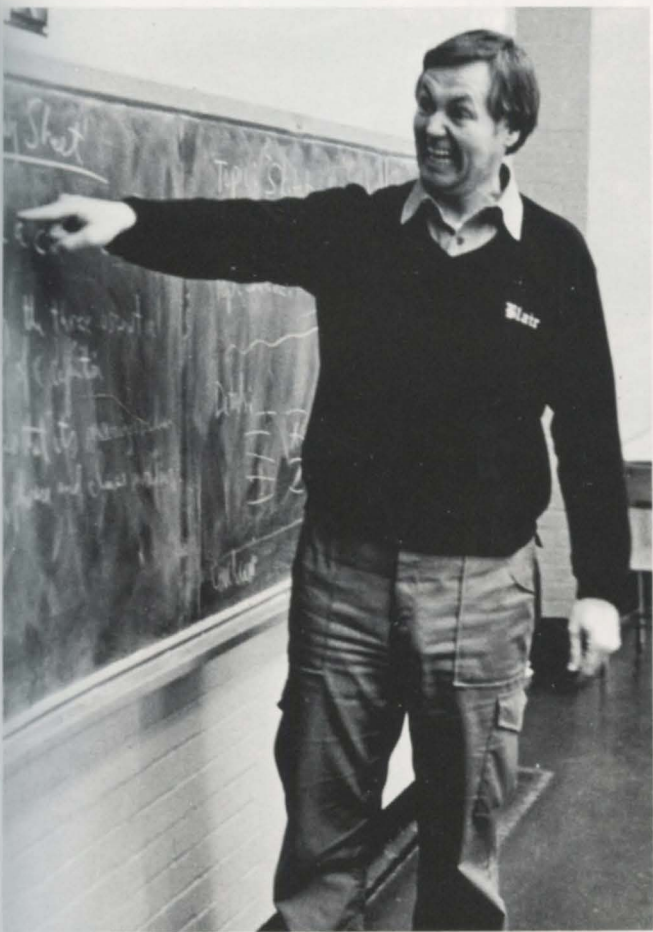

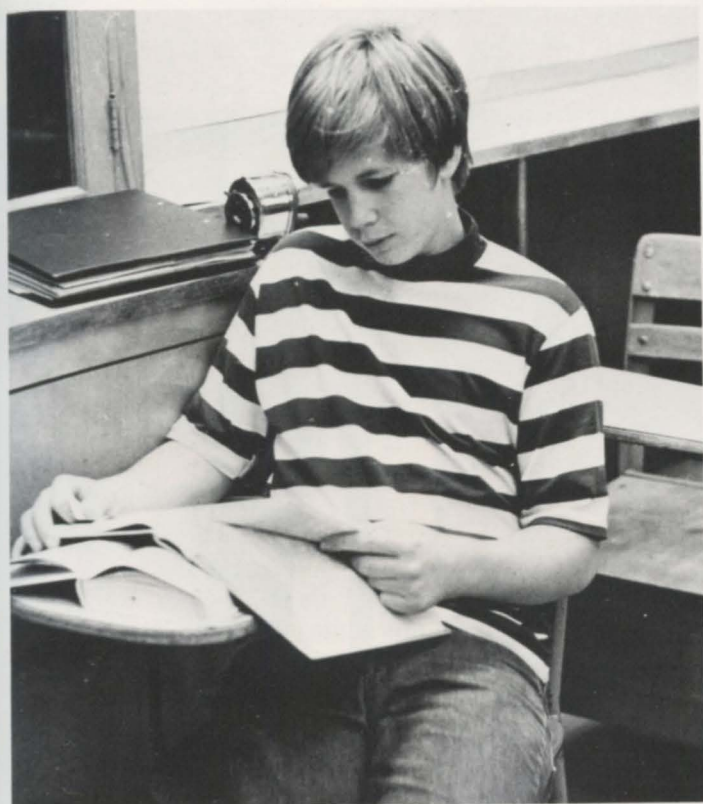

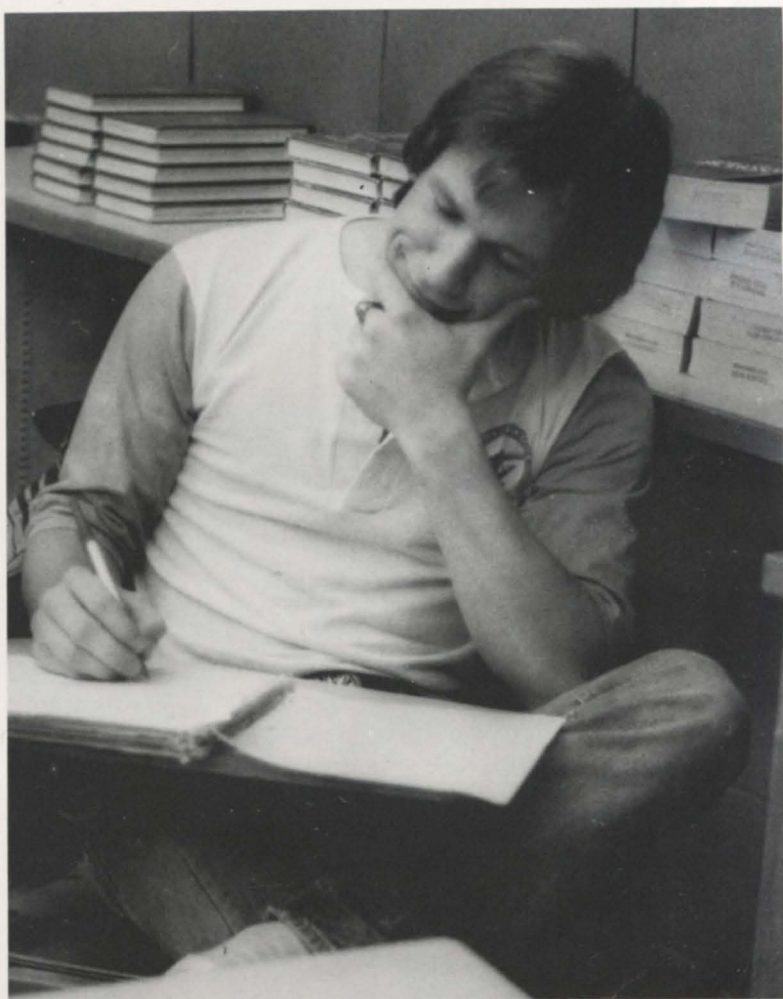

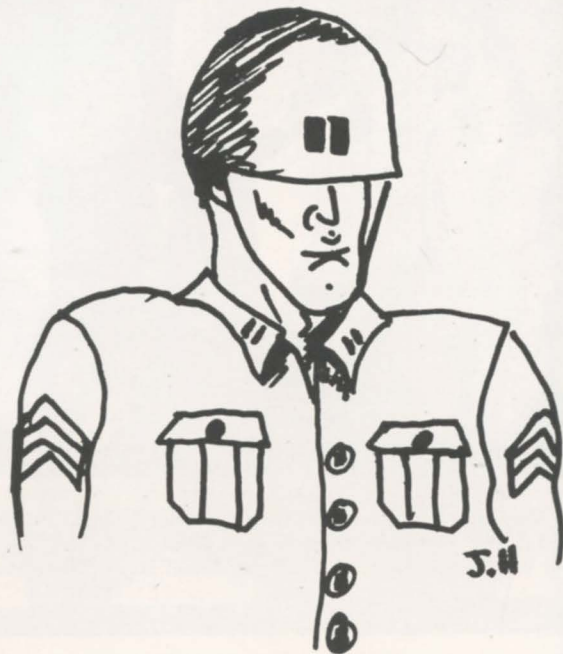

All persons involved are commended for a great job in planning for all the events for our entire student body!



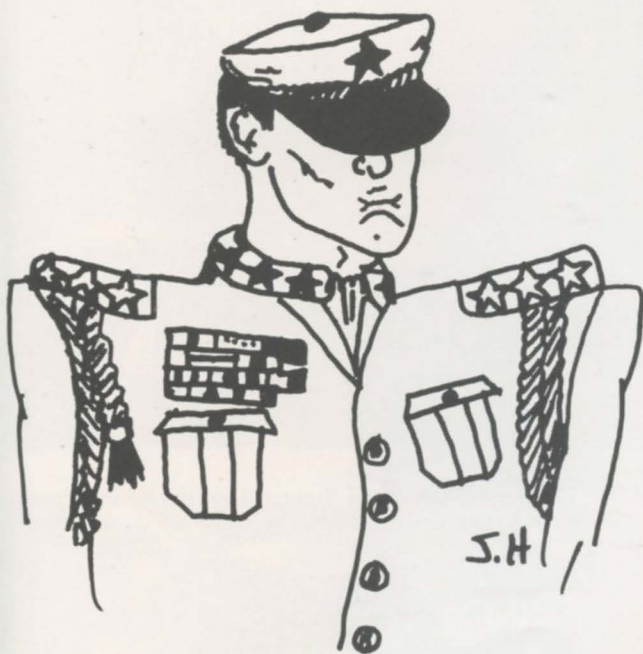

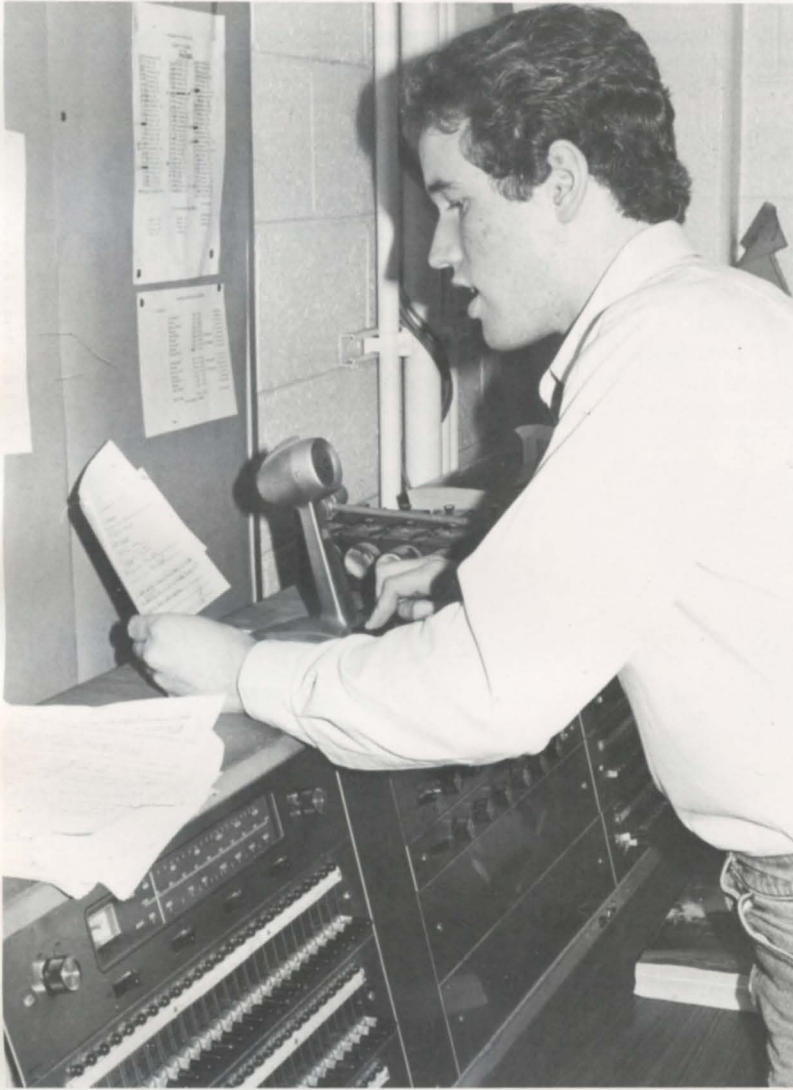

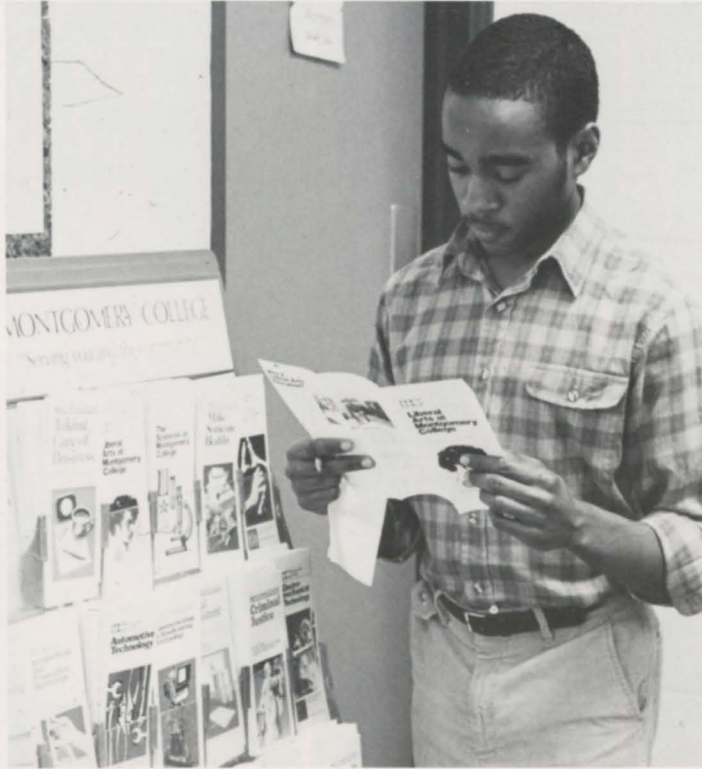

Senior year was a time to think, a time to pause, a time for important decisions; senior year was a time between the past and the future.

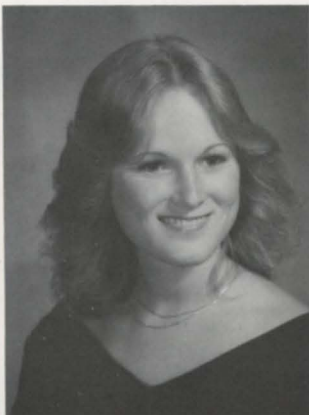

When a student like Michelle Miles has access to a car it provides more choices to pick from to go to lunch.



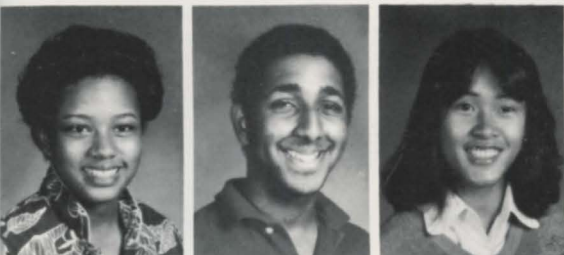

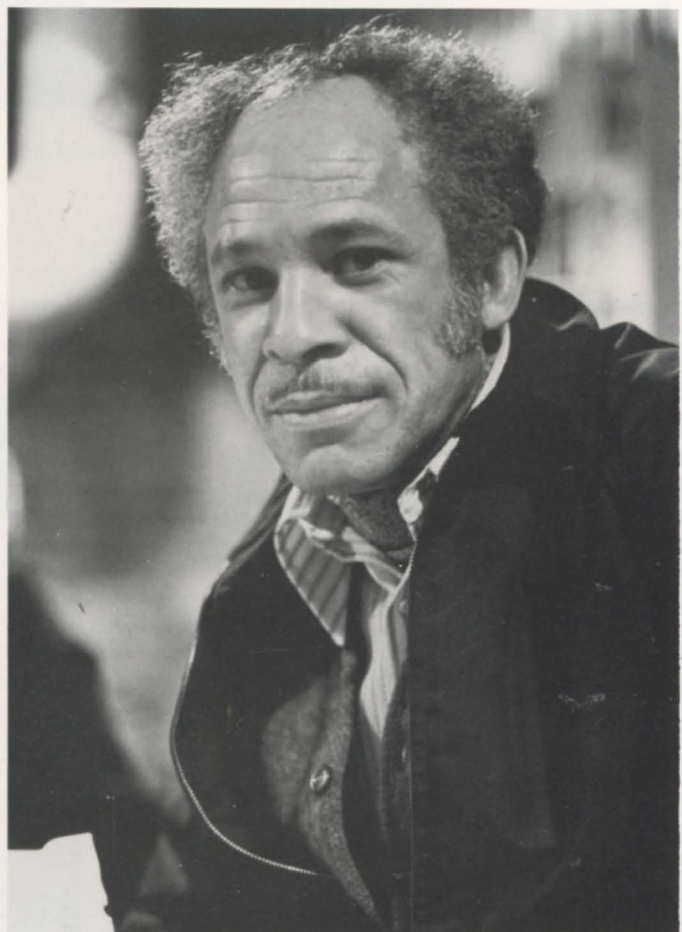
Talent Beyond The Classroom

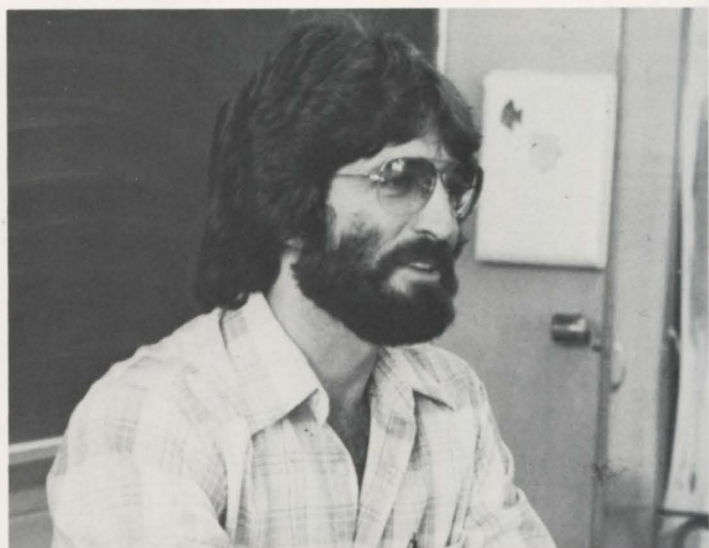

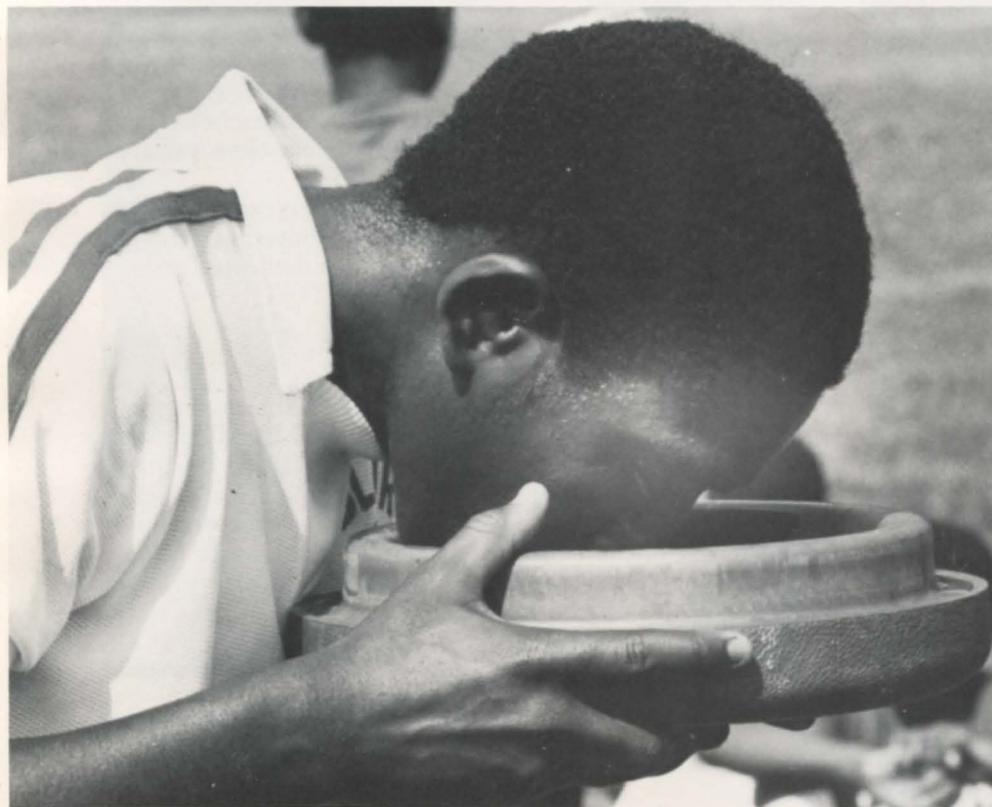
To work at the same school for twenty years shows a great devotion to teaching. Blair students have been truly lucky throughout the years to have such a dedicated group of people serving them.

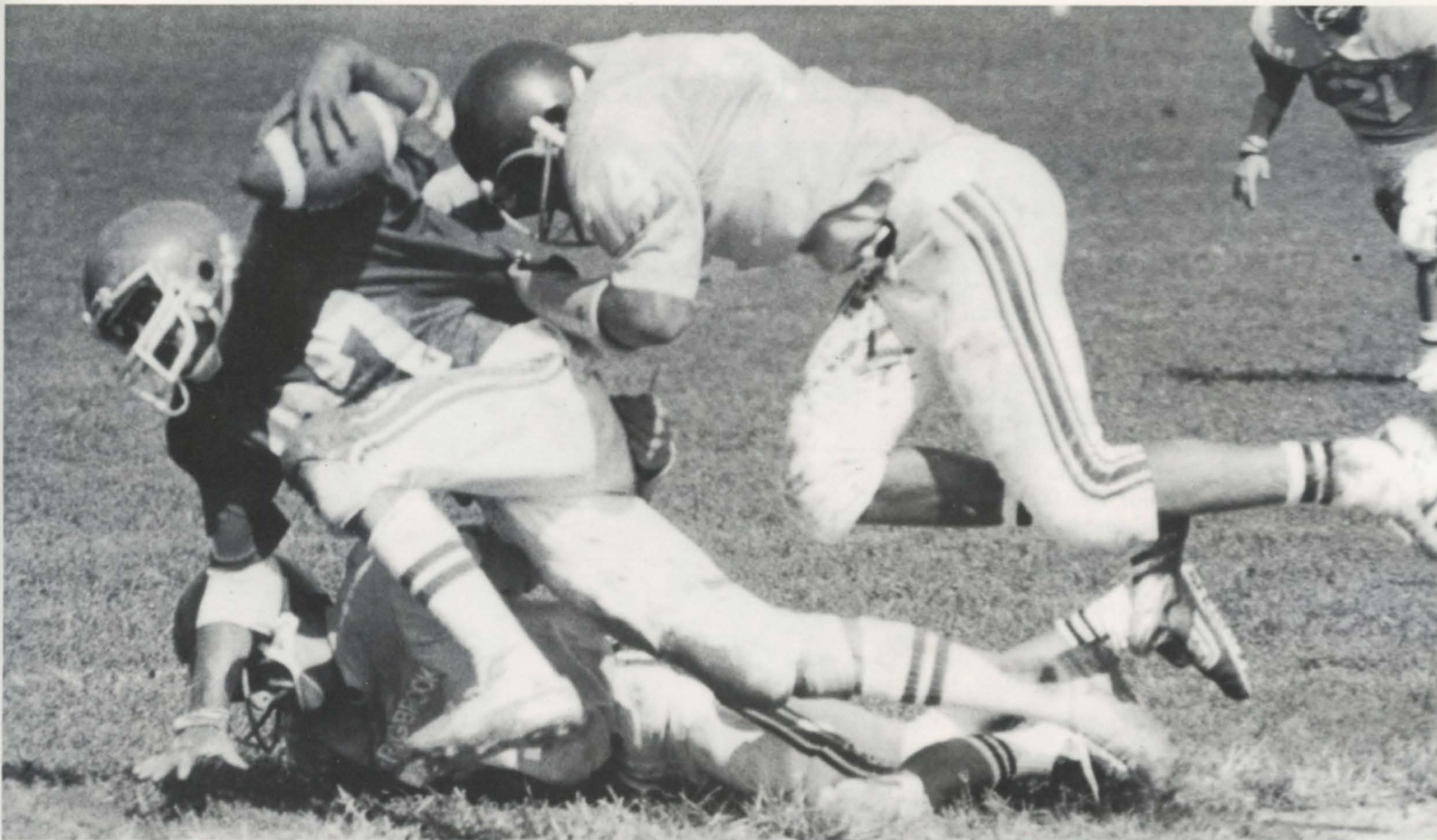

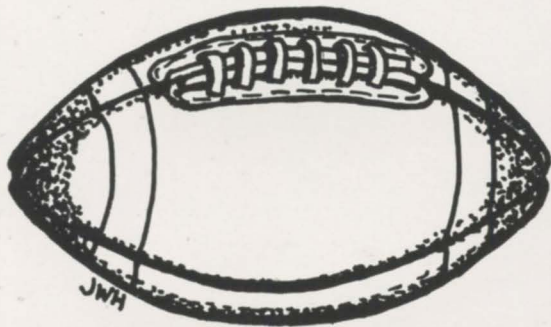

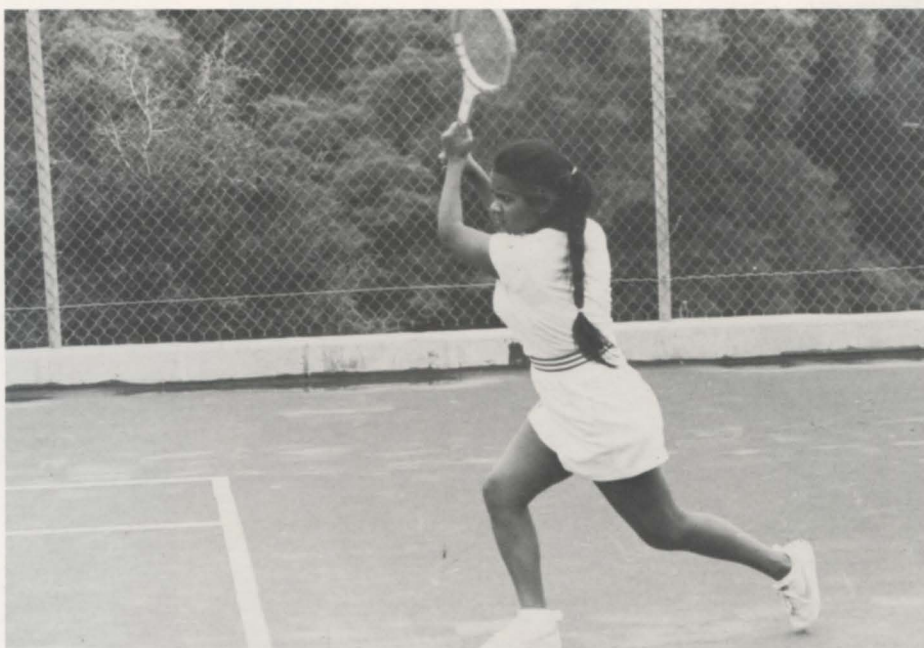

Watch Out For The Blazers!

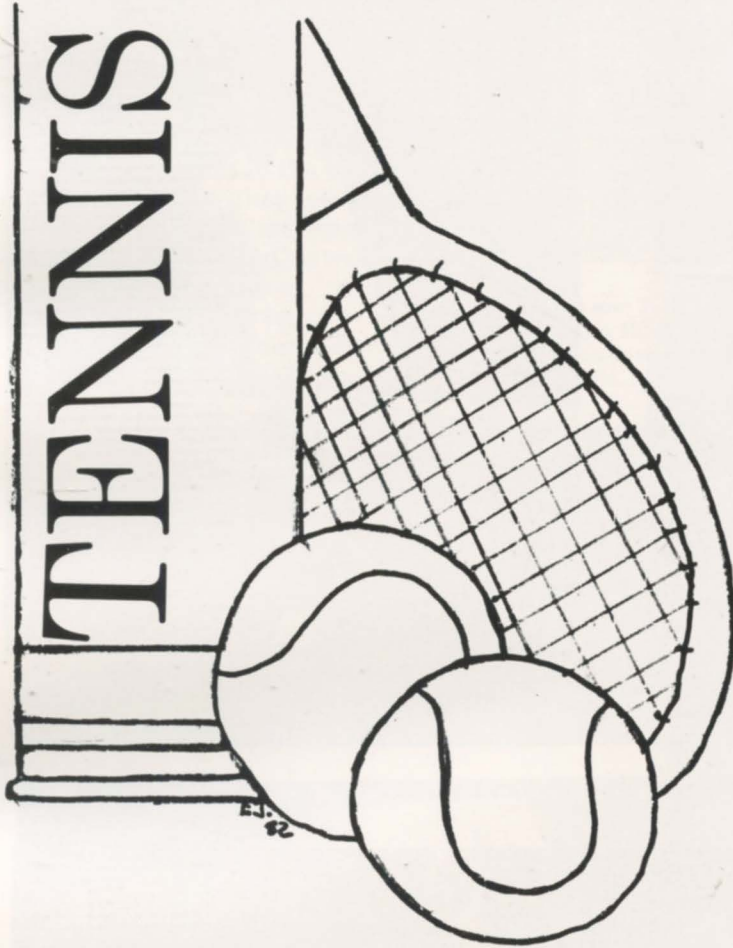

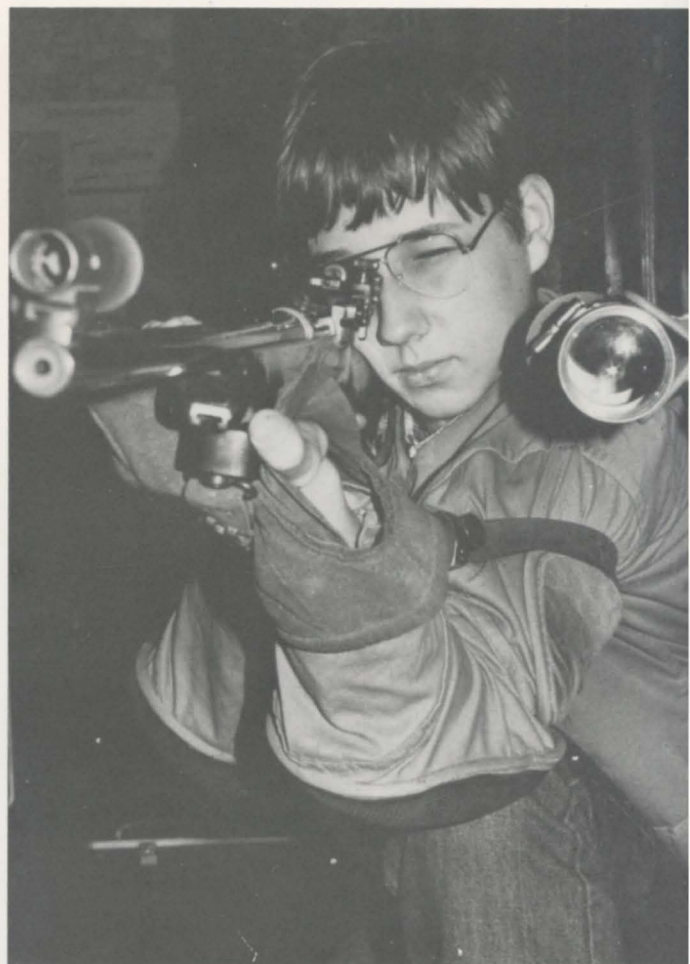

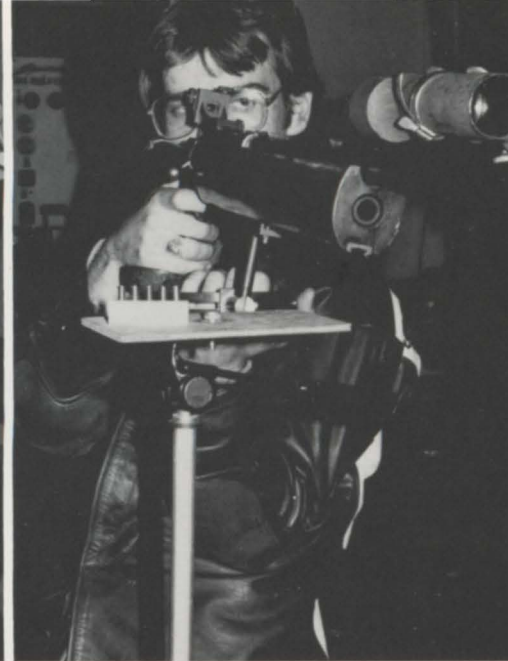

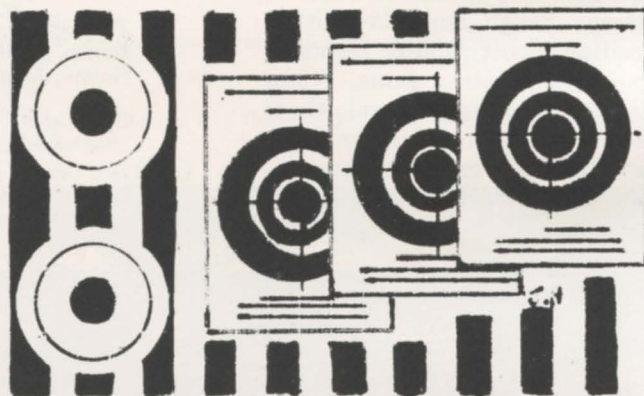

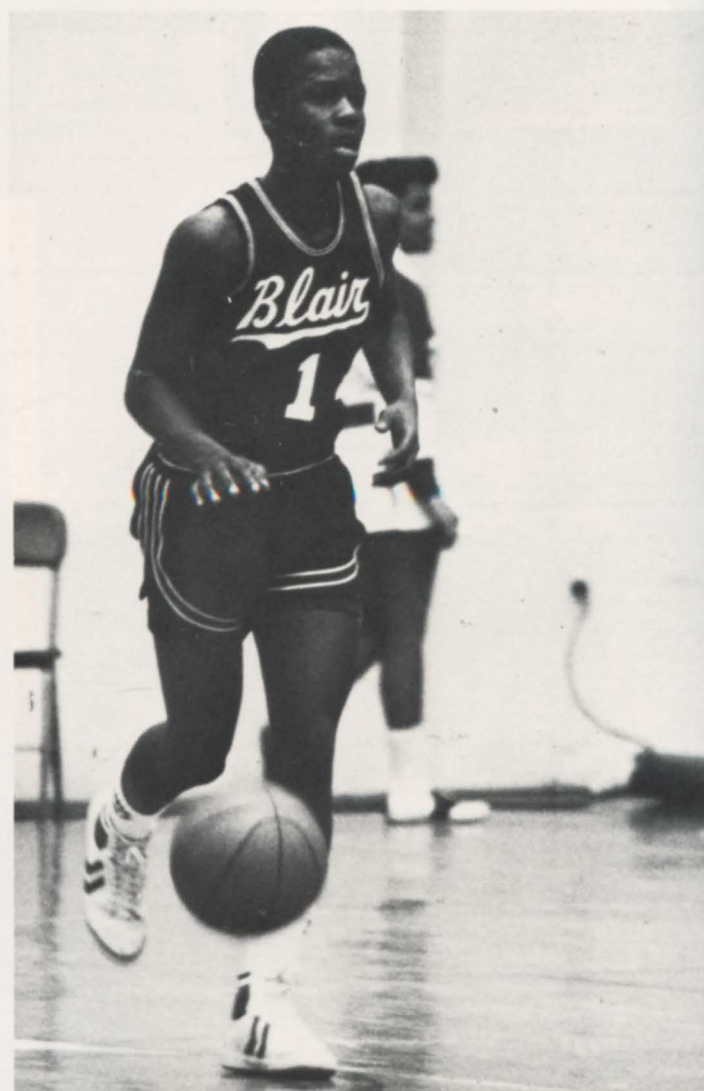
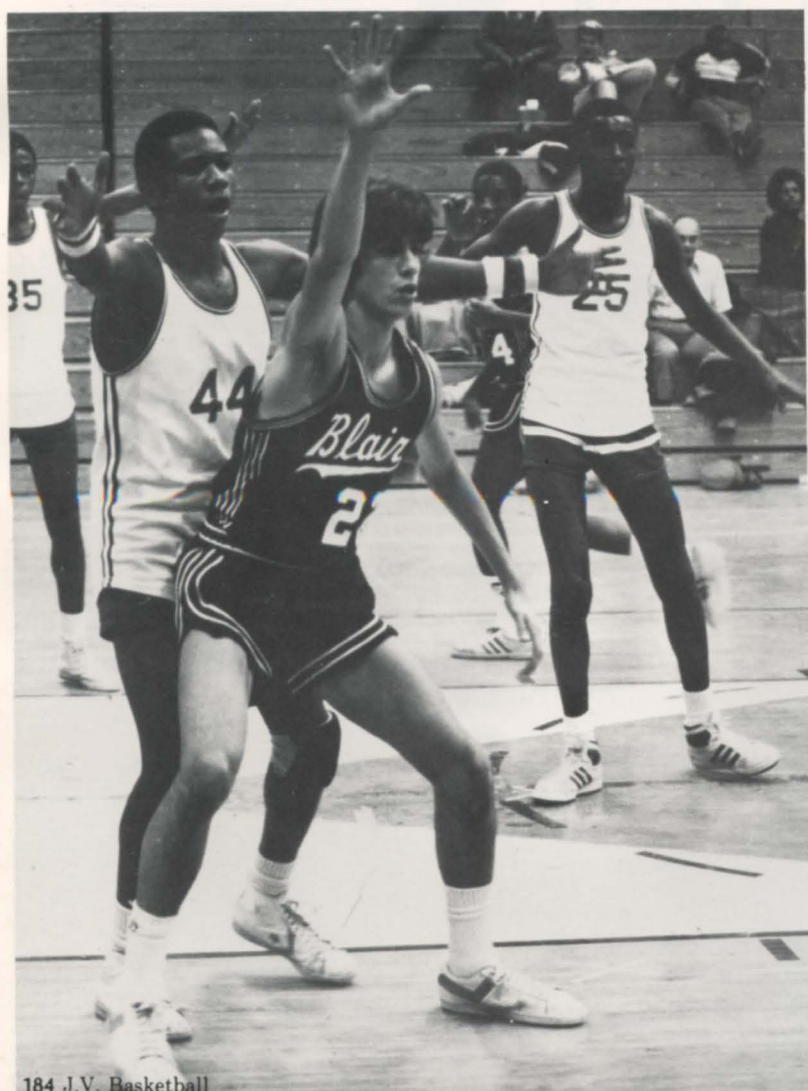
Baby Blazers Shoot For Success

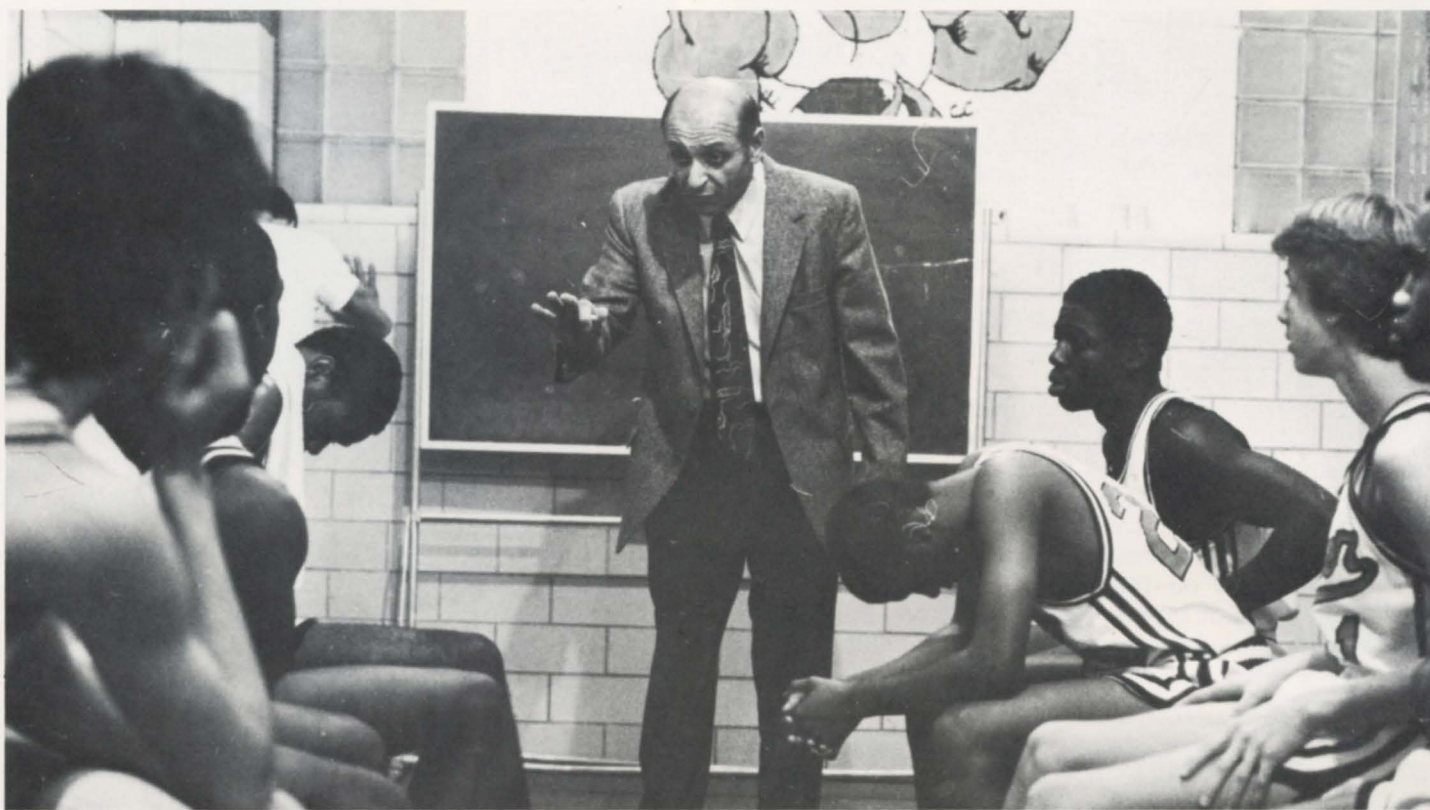

The 1981-82 Varsity Basketball Team, in complete compliance with Blazer tradition, had a remarkably successful season. Blair began on a bad note, losing to sixth-ranked McNamara. But, so what? Blair had started off the same way the last two years and was still successful in obtaining winning seasons.

The Blazers usually started Ron Williams and Pat Anderson at the guard positions, with Randy Inniss and Lawrence Davis at the forwards, while Stefan Baylor was the franchise at center. Williams and Baylor were the most experienced players on the team, each with three years of experience.

Stefan Baylor led the team in scoring

and rebounding, averaging 22 points and 6 rebounds a game. Ron Williams was a real team leader, scoring about 8 points a game along with a 7 assist a game average. Randy Inniss was the second leading scorer, with a 13 point a game average. Lawrence Davis was the third leading scorer with an average of 12 points a game, mostly coming from fastbreaks. Pat Anderson, the point-guard, averaged 8 assists a game, leading the team in that department. Greg Rex was usually sent in off of the bench to play point-guard. Rex averaged 6 points a game, these points were usually the results of all the steals he had. David McCloud and Mandel Gregory, two quality players, were usually sent into

the game to relieve Baylor and/or Inniss. McCloud always played hard beneath the offensive and defensive boards. Gregory was a great perimeter shot, with a touch much like that of Mike DeLaViez from the 1979-80 team.

Several of the players won the honors of being named to the All-County and All-Metropolitan teams. Ron Williams and Stefan Baylor were named to the All-County team, while Baylor was also named to the All-Metropolitan team, which enabled him to participate in the Capital Classic, making it three years in a row that Blair had been represented. In typical Blazer fashion, the basketball team ended the season a success.

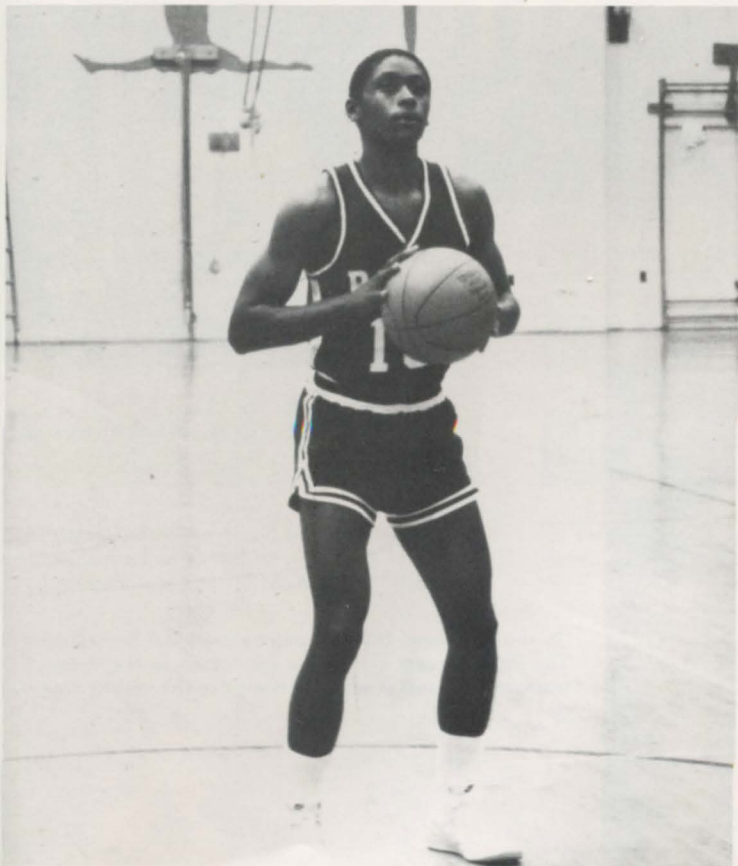

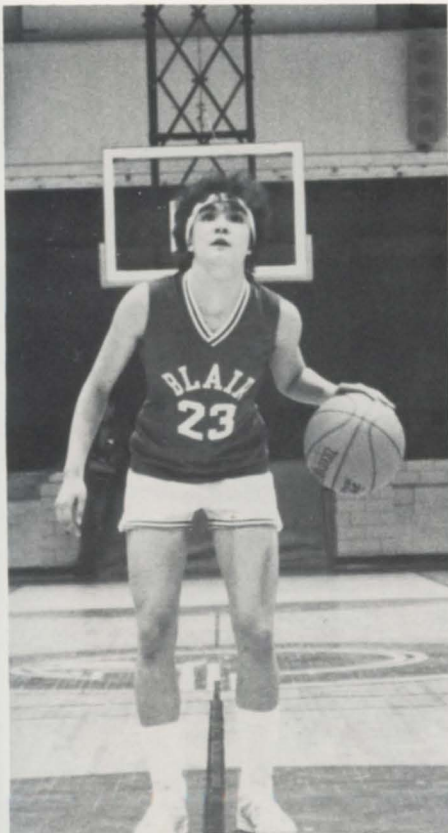

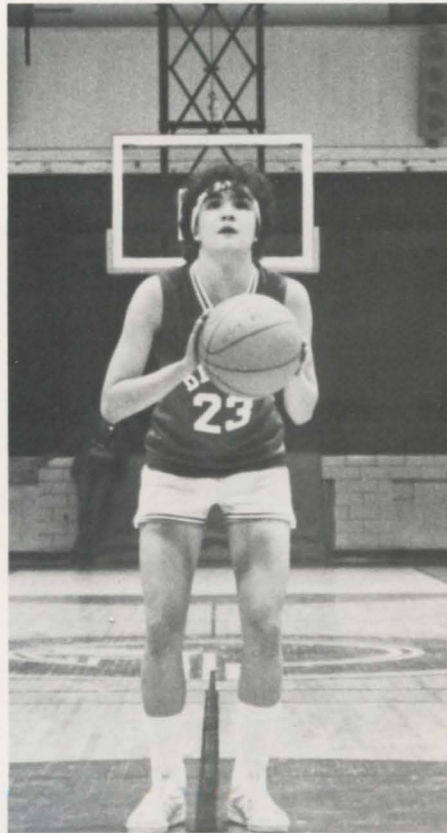

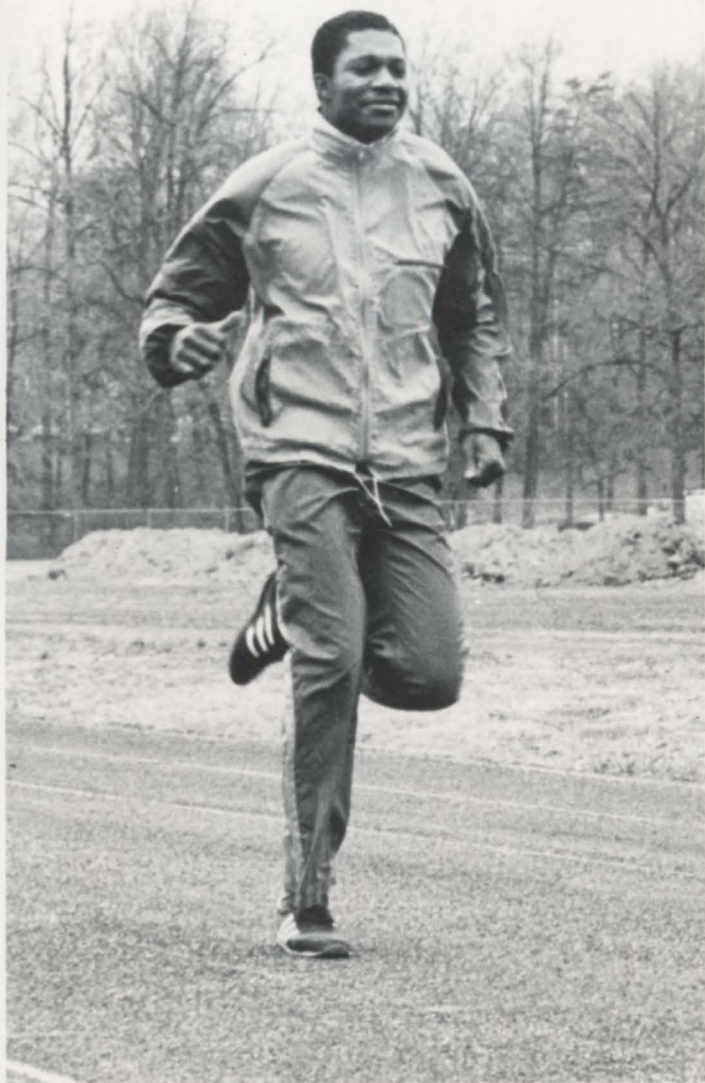

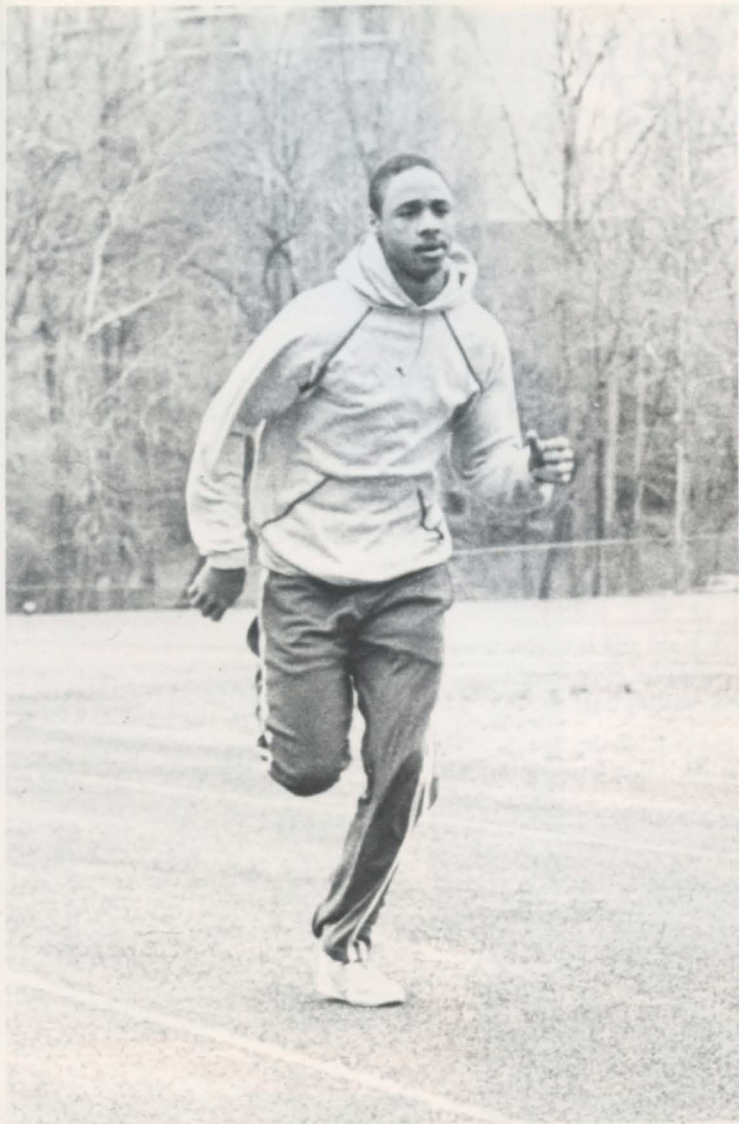

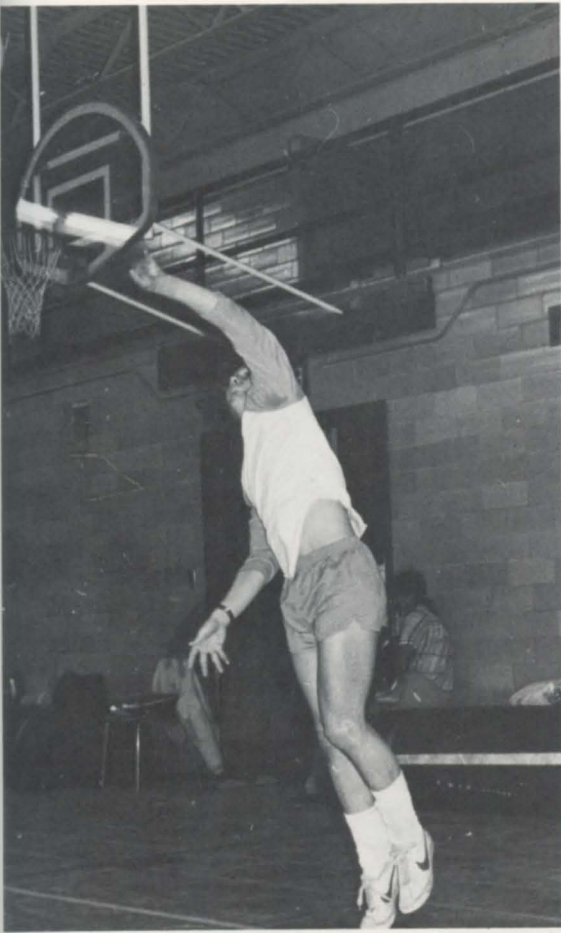

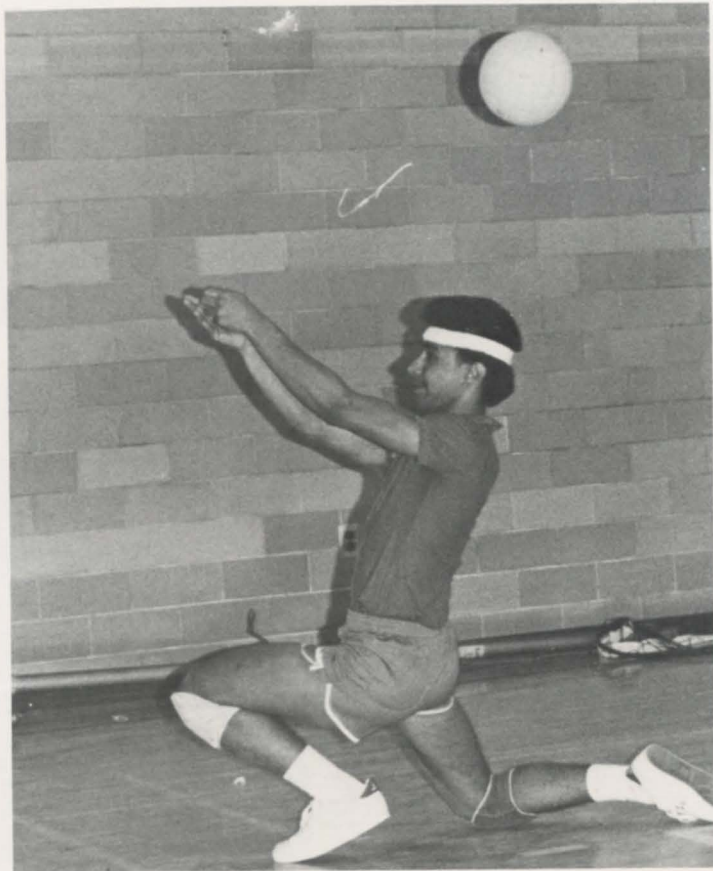

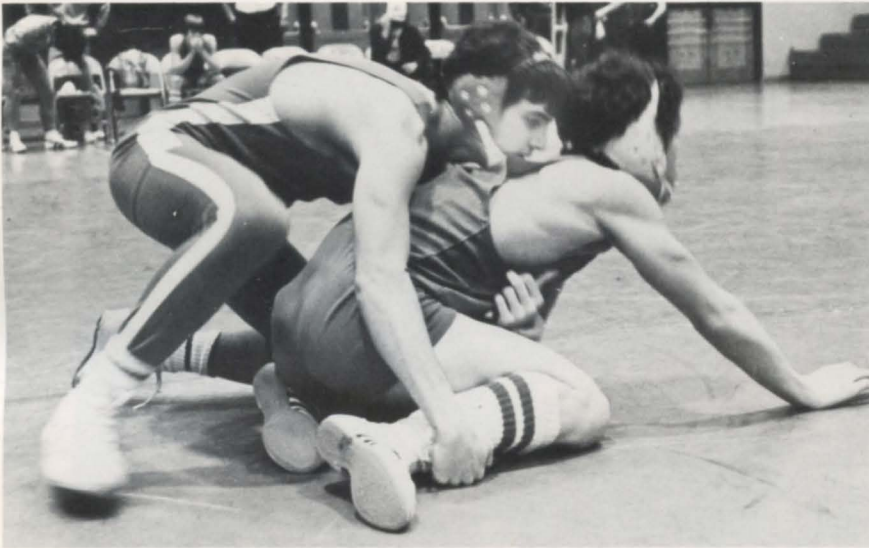
ance to help them through the season.

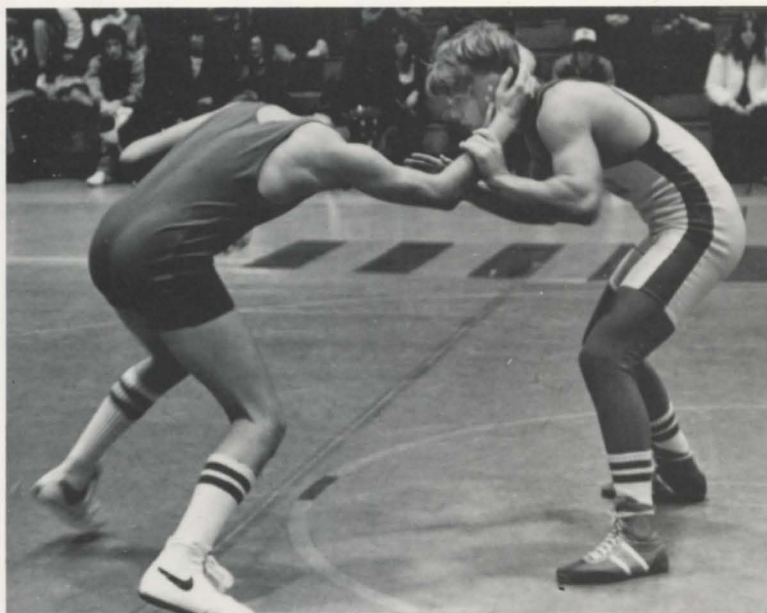




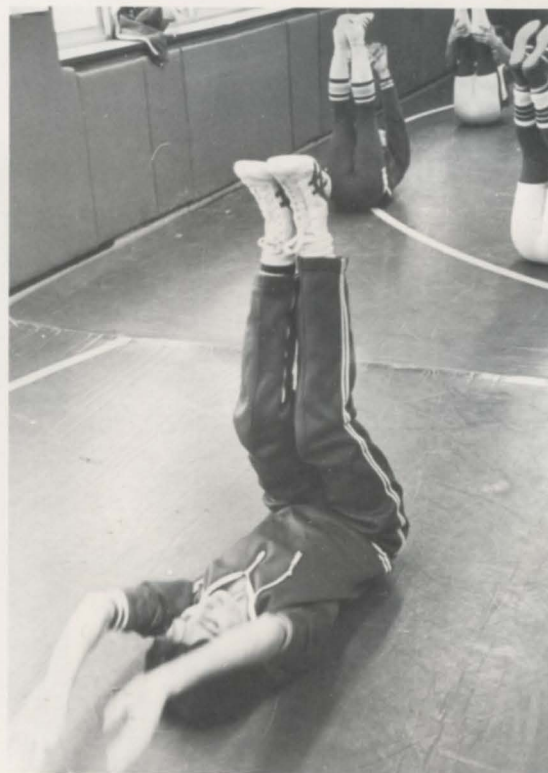

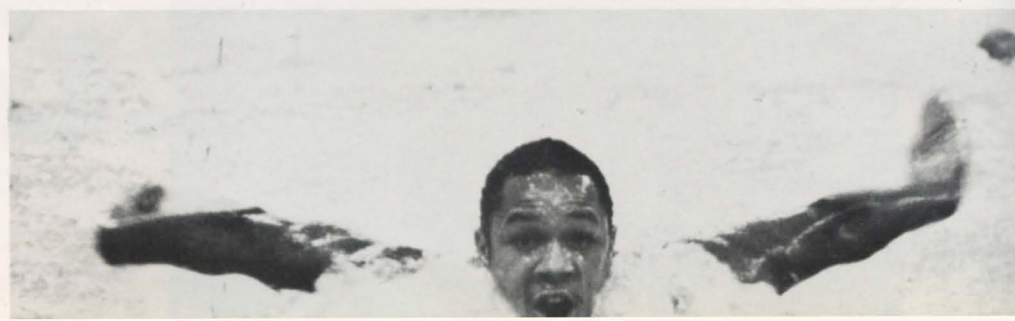

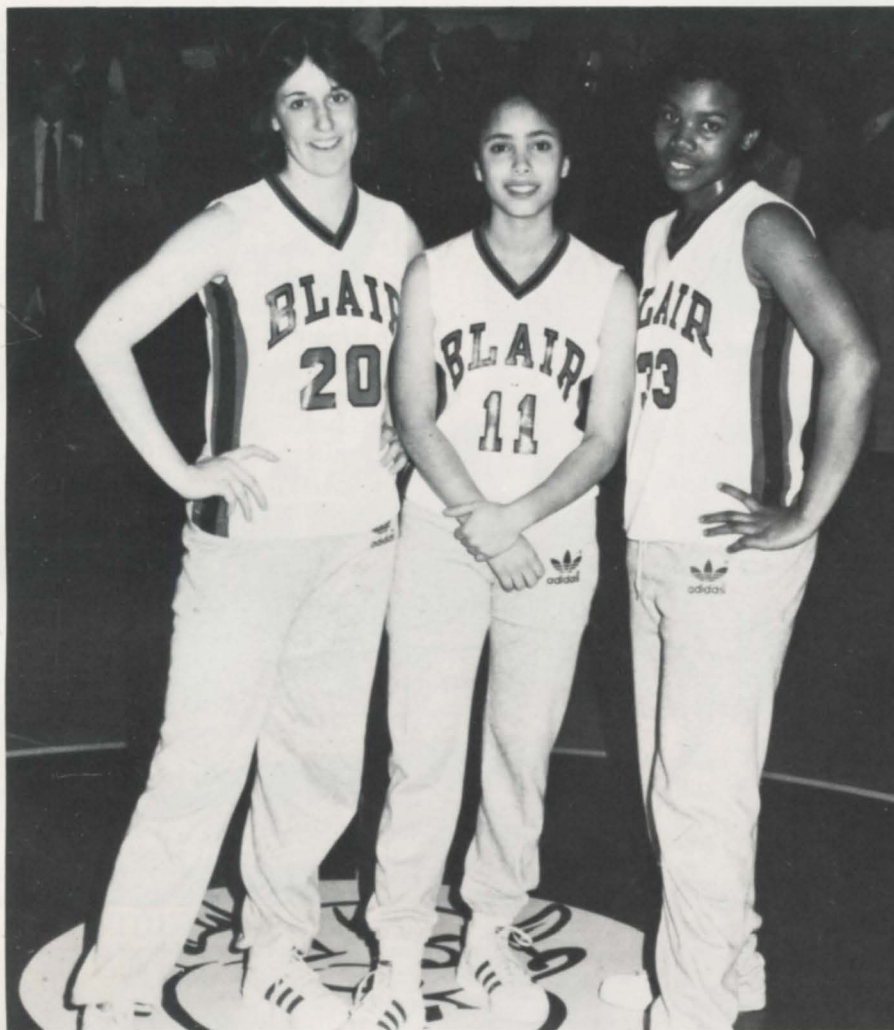
