The group's sponsor, Mr. Hopkins, taught and added to the member's knowledge of such skills as auto mechanics; but the most important skills learned by the group members
were their leadership skills.
For those students interested in the health occupations field, there was H.O.S.A. H.O.S.A. Health Occupations of America, was a group that emphasized leadership skills and community service. "The mission of H.O.S.A. is to enhance the delivery of quality health care to Americans", as stated in their pamphlet. Blair students who committed themselves to this organization were required to travel to the Edison Center daily for classes in the health field.
